30TH ANNIVERSARY ATTENDED

On March 27, nine Brothers representing our Lodge went to Camp Monocan, near Charlottesville, to help Koo Koo Ku Hoo Lodge 161 celebrate its 30th Anniversary. Most of the Lodges in Area III C sent de agations to this fellowship week-end. representatives were: Past Chief Bob Barclay, Chief Chris Smith, Recording Secretary Bruce Davidson, Unit Elections Chairman Ray Dery, Camping Promotion Chairman Larry Sutton, Kryer Reporters Donny Buck and John Gourley, Membership Committee Adviser, Lewis Andrews, and Lodge Adviser, Bailey Tudder.

We got there about 11:00 Friday night, checked in, got partly acquainted at a pizza-party type cracker barrel, and got into bed for the usual "quiet" first night in Camp. Saturday morning we dropped in on the Koo Koo Ku Hoo workshop discussion groups on lodge activities and projects. After lunch, most of us climbed a nearby mountain and explored the caves and tunnels of an abandoned copper mine. In the early evening, Nowakwa Lodge 3 convened an informal Area III C meeting to sample opinions on the latest concepts for the 1969 Pow Wow they will host as part of their 50th Anniversary. MR. DAVIS MOVES ON

In February, too late for the news to be included in the February Kryer, Peninsula Council Scout Executive and Kecoughtan Lodge 463 Supreme Chief of the Fire Paul R. Davis, Jr. was transferred to a new location. He is now Scout Executive for Washington Trail Council, with headquarters at Erie, Pennsylvania.

Before coming here, Mr. Davis was Assistant Scout Executive with Daniel Boone Council in Redding, Pennsylvania. He was our Scout Executive for six and one-half years and has sixteen years of professional scouting over-all, starting with the very stiff professional training course at Schiff Scout Reservation in New Jersey.

Vigil Honor Order of the Arrowman Paul Davis will be remembered most by Peninsula Scouts for his efforts in acquiring the new 735 acre scout reservation. Most of us call it Camp Chickahominy; but that is only the name of the first of 3 summer camps that will be built on the reservation. Under Mr. Davis' supervision, Kecoughtan Lodge did much to build and improve Camp Chickahominy. He established firmly in our Lodge the tradition of service to camp development, a tradition








Dance Team Chief Roger Mills (L) shows Indian headgear to new members Marty Tant, Kenny Nourse and Mark Karika.

Also, we remind you that the Brotherhood Examination will be given, and successful candidates will be inducted to Brotherhood Membership, at both the Spring and Summer Ordeals.

Your application for Brotherhood Membership, with your written rededication to cheerful service (see below) must be received 2 weeks before the ceremonial dates. Take or send them to the following address by June 1 for the Spring Ordeal:

CHANGES IN BROTHERHOOD REQUIREMENTS

The first three Brotherhood requirements - 10 or more months of active service as an Ordeal member, active registered membership in Scouting, and active registered membership in the lodge -- remain the same. Each Ordeal member will now be given a copy of the Brotherhood Questionaire, No. 5007, as soon as he has completed the Ordeal ceremony. He is required to memorize the Obligation and the Order of the Arrow song, "Firm Bound in Brotherhood"; he must be able to answer all questions in the questionnaire satisfactorily; and he must submit a written statement regarding his rededication to the principle of cheerful service to his fellow men.

Presenting the Brotherhood Questionnaire to each new Ordeal member will help him to understand the Order of the Arrow and to be better prepared to seal his membership in the Order when he goes through the Brotherhood ceremony.

The new requirement of a written statement regarding rededication to the principles of cheerful service to his fellow men causes each candidate for Brother-hood to reflect upon the true meaning and purpose of the Order. This should be a short, simple statement of 100 to 200 words that any boy can readily put down on paper. It should include a statement showing that the boy realizes that the purpose of the Order is really cheerful service -- service to his own unit, service to Scouting, service to camping. It should indicate that the boy thoroughly understands the Scout Oath and Law and that he will continue to practice the principles of Scouting in his daily life. (Written statements are also required of adults)


NEW SCOUT EXECUTIVE ARRIVES
