


WHAT YOUR LODGE FLAP PATCH MEANS

The chain of brotherhood, signified by the unbroken stitch bordering our patch, is also shown in the three "W's" imposed on its face. The red arrow pointing toward the right shoulder reminds us of the nationwide Order of the Arrow to which we belong. They also remind us to live up to the Admonition. The black background stands for the secrecy of the traditions of the Order and willingness to keep them within the Order.

In the center and top corners there are three acorns. The three stands for the three points of the Scout Oath and W.W.W. which we, as Scouts and brothers, promise to uphold. The acorns signify the forests of oak that were so bountiful in this region. They also symbolize



The silver lettering stands for the brightness of our deeds that we will not tarnish in our striving and endeavors. We will always be guided by cheerful service to others rather than to ourselves.


The two Confederate flags symbolize Southern heritage and traditions of bravery and gallantry which in all ages keep man true to their individual beliefs, even against overwhelming odds.



Bob will be at the Commonwealth of Virginia University again this year, but he has yet to miss a Lodge Meeting.


FALL FELLOWSHIP APPROAGHES






Larry Hayes, Jim Allen, Dave (Doc) Horton watch Masanori Fujimura consume his meal with ease.




Masanori shows John Moore, Bruce Davidson and John Bishop the proper way to handle chopsticks.




(R. to L.) Larry Hayes, Bill Bailey Cliff Sleeman and Masanori relax after their oriental dinner.




By September our membership will have doubled since last year and the Kryer Staff will be greatly handicapped unless we can recruit some new members to help us.



ABOVE- Pat Armstrong, Joe Langford and Cliff Sleeman kept watchful eyes over the troop swims during the camp.









The swimming area at Camp Chickahominy.
