


A memorable rededication ceremony was a fitting ending to this unforgettable evening.

NATIONAL CONFERENCE

Do you like Pow-Wows? From August 23rd thru the 26th, 1969, the Order of the Arrow will hold its annual National Conference. "Back Home Again in Indiana" will be the 54th Anniversary Conference, marking the sixth time the Conference has been held at the University of Indiana in Bloomington.

The conference fee is \$35.00, but because of transportation and food costs, the total outlay will amount to about \$85.00! Since the national quota is only 4,000 Arrowmen, Kecoughtan Lodge will be limited to 15 delegates. If you are interested, please notify Chris Smith.

For any new members who are not acquainted with the National organization, the National Order of the Arrow Conference is held every two years, at which time a new National Chief is elected.

Besides being the main attraction every two years and an excellent chance to learn more about the Order of the Arrow, this will be an experience no one will ever forget. You will meet Arrowmen from all over the world, and for patch collectors, the National O.A. Conference is the summit of trading jubilees. Attendance at this conference is a goal well worth aiming for.


Above - Registration finds Bruce Brown and Bronwin Foster anxiously awaiting a night of fun and fellowship.



KNOW YOUR LODGE OFFICERS

Chris Smith - Lodge Chief

Chris Smith joined the Boy Scouts (Troop 43) in 1961 at the age of 11. He was elected to the Order of the Arrow at the age of 13 and earned his Brother-hood in 1964.

In 1966 Chris became the Chairman of the Unit Elections Committee, and the following year, Lodge Chief. That summer he attended Philmont Scout Ranch in Cimmaron, New Mexico. After he returned from Philmont, Chris was awarded the Outstanding Citizenship Award by the Moose Lodge.

Chris attended the last Area III-C Pow-Wow at Camp Powhatan, in Hiwassee, Virginia. In June of 1968 he was elected for a second term as Lodge Chief, a truly great honor, and in December the same year he earned his Eagle. At the last Christmas Banquet it was announced that Chris was elected a Vigil candidate.

Chris Smith is a sophomore at Christopher Newport College and hopes to attend Bridgewater College next year.

SCOUT OF THE YEAR

The Scout of the Year for 1968 is Larry Sutton, our Vice-Chief.

Larry joined Boy Scouts in 1960 and was elected to the Order of the Arrow in 1965. The following year he earned his Brotherhood.

In 1967, Larry completed his religious award, the God and Country medal, and attended the World Jamboree that summer at Farragut State Park, Idaho.

In 1968 Larry became an Eagle Scout and was elected to receive the Vigil Honor in December of the same year. He attended the 1968 Area III-C Pow-Wow at Camp Powhatan, and attended the Area III-C Training Institute at Camp Rock Enon. Larry has also attended Philmont Scout Ranch at Cimmaron, New Mexico and the National Junior Leadership Training Camp at Schiff Scout Reservation, Mendham, New Jersey.

Larry is presently a junior at Bethel High School, where he is Presi-dent of the Key Club.

KITCHEN KABINET

The annual Area III-C Kitchen Kabinet meeting was held on November 16, 1968 at the Hot Shoppe in Richmond, Va. Members who attended from Kecoughtan Lodge #463 were: Chris Smith (Lodge Chief), Larry Sutton (Vice-Chief), Corky Whitehead (Corresponding Secretary), Bobby Barclay (Treasurer), and Mr. Bailey Tudder (Lodge Adviser).

The meeting was opened at 11:00 a.m. by Peter J. Osina, Area III-C Chief, with the O. A. Obligation and his welcome. The minutes of the 1967 Kitchen Kabinet meeting were read by the Area Secretary and approved. Each of the 9 Lodge Chiefs then gave a 3 minute report on his lodge's most significant function during the past year. Old business was wrapped up by reports on the 1968 Area III-C Pow-Wow and the 1968 Area III-C Training Institute was made.

At noon the Arrowmen recessed for a delicious lunch.

At 1:00 p.m. the Arrowmen reconvened to begin discussions on new business. The 1969 National Order of the Arrow Conference at the University of Indiana was briefly discussed and it was pointed out that Kecoughtan Lodge was eligible to send 15 delegates.

One of the main points of business, the 1969 Area III-C Pow-Wow, was brought up by Jim Duesberry, Nawakwa Lodge Chief. Kecoughtan Lodge had been limited to 88 delegates, however, anyone who wishes to attend may now do so. Amangamek Wipit Lodge requested their quota be reduced by several hundred, thus Kecoughtan's spaces were increased. The various Area competitions were brought up. They were the Display Contest, Dance Competitions, Camping Promotions Contest, and Newsletter Competitions. This year the Kecoughtan Lodge has chosen the topic of "Realism in Dance and Cermonial Costumes in the Order of the Arrow".

The Vigil Rededication, a challenge from the Area Adviser, Vernon G. LaBarre, and the closing and adjournment, given by the Area Chief, marked the end of the 1968 Kitchen Kabinet Meeting.

FEBRUARY ORDEAL

The first Winter Ordeal in the history of Kecoughtan Lodge will be held February 14 - 15, 1969 at Camp Chickahominy. Everyone is asked to arrive at 6:00 p.m. Friday night.

The fee is only \$3.00 so everyone should be able to attend. Also, a special patch will be available for \$.70.

In all probability, the main project will be working on our new Ceremonial Ring. This will require a lot of labor from many brothers - so let's all turn out for this event.

All ceremonies, Ordeal, Brother-hood, and Vigil will be finished by mid-night on Saturday, February 15th. If you choose, you may stay over Saturday night and have a hearty Sunday breakfast for an additional \$.50.


