

Brothers,





Although there is still much to do, I must congratulate our lodge on the fine work it has done.






Above - Bob Lawson, Pamlico Chapter Chief, registers O.A. Brothers to the 1st Winter Ordeal.

WHAT'S AN EAGLE?

When a SCOUT BECOMES AN EAGLE SCOUT he's still a boy, but he is no longer an ordinary boy. Only a few more than half a million Scouts have ever advanced to Scouting's highest rank. Approximately 1½ percent of the more than 40 million Scouts who have eagerly started off on the Eagle trail since the beginning of Scouting in America completed the journey. The Eagle has followed a long, rugged, and rewarding trail.

No two Eagle Scouts are exactly alike, yet all are fundamentally the same. By listing some of these fundamentals, perhaps I can give you an idea of what an Eagle Scout is. The final result is the uses the boy makes of them as he grows into manhood.

He has learned that reverence to God comes before all other things.

He knows that respect for the rights and convictions of others is part of his duty to God and his fellowmen.

He demonstrates the true meaning of loyalty--although he may not be able to define it.

He has learned discipline and teamwork and how to apply them in his daily living.

He has developed his own code of honor, based on the ideals of Scout-ing.

He has learned that physical bravery may require less courage than standing up for one's convictions.

He has perseverence and determination. (He had to in order to attain the rank of Eagle Scout.)

He had knowledge that nature gives to those who seek it.

He has Scouting skills that will be invaluable to him all his life.

He presents a cheerful outlook on life even in the face of hardships and disappointments.

His is more than a vague idea of what duty to his country is; he realizes that his starts with duty to God, his family, and himself.

Please bring your written statement to camp. We do not expect a "school theme" kind of paper. Just tell us in simple words how you have and will actually continue to serve Scouting and, through it, your fellow men.

Do your part in making Kecoughtan 463 a National Standard Order of the Arrow Lodge in BOYPOWER '76. Help us get and keep at least 50 percent Brotherhood membership.

Starting time is 6:00 PM Friday, May 10. Please arrive and check in promptly. All lodge business will be completed by midnight Saturday, May 11. You may finish the night in camp if you wish, in order to avoid late-night driving. Because May 12 is Mothers Day, camp must be cleared by 9:00 AM. No, repeat, no food will be available Sunday.

Brotherhood Candidates will be examined Friday night and Saturday. The Brotherhood Ceremony will precede the Ordeal Ceremony Saturday night

In accordance with the amended Lodge Rules, officers for the year starting Sep 1st, 1969 will be elected after supper, Saturday, May 11.



In looking over our roster, I notice that many adults have not promptly sealed their membership in the Order through the Broth-erhood Ceremony. This is cause for concern.

Attainment of 50% Brotherhood membership is one of the requirements for becoming a National Standard Lodge. The concept of National Standard Order of the Arrow Lodges was defined in the "Order of the Arrow and BOYPOWER '76" reprint on page 5 of the October 1968 Kryer.

As adult leaders in the Scouting movement, and, more particularly, as advisers and coaches of BOY LEADERS in the Order of the Arrow, we have a serious obligation to set the very best possible example. If we are eligible for Brotherhood, we should be such. In support of my statements, I quote from page 32 of the 1968 edition of the Handbook, "The Brotherhood is an opportunity for members to evaluate their past contributions to Scouting and the lodge and to reaffirm their belief in the high purposes of the Order. The ceremony is intended as a source of inspiration, motivating its members to render

even greater service to Scouting."

Can you argue with that?

The requirements are simple. They appear on pages 6 and 7 of this issue. Please accept your personal obligation by registering as a Brotherhood Candidate in the Spring Ordeal-Fellowship. Do so on the reservation form at the bottom of page 9.
