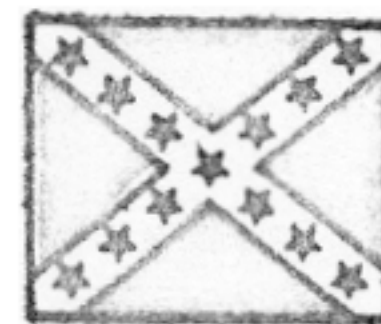
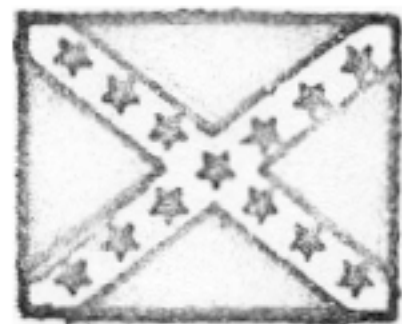

## FROM THE CHIEF'S TEPEE

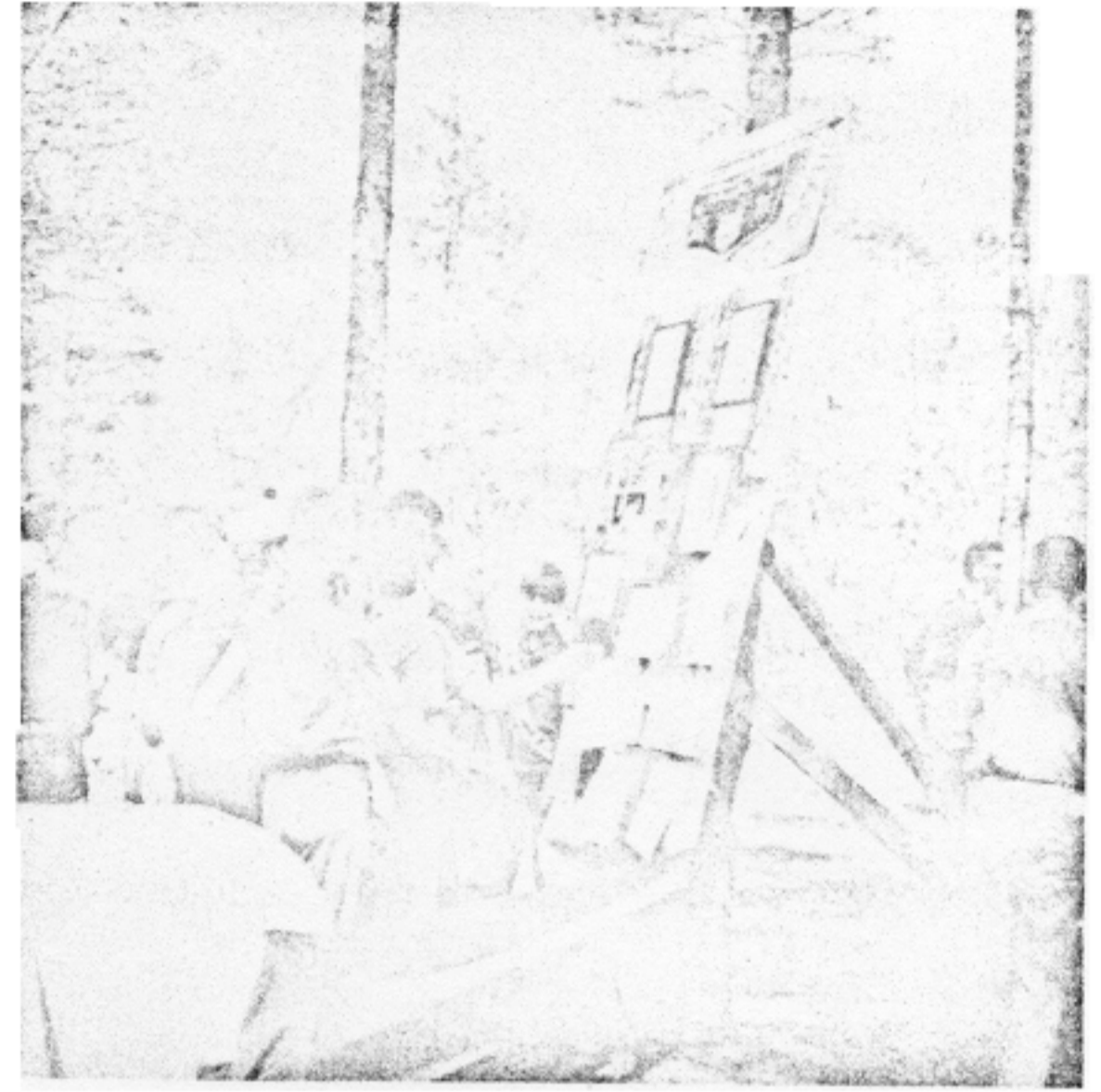
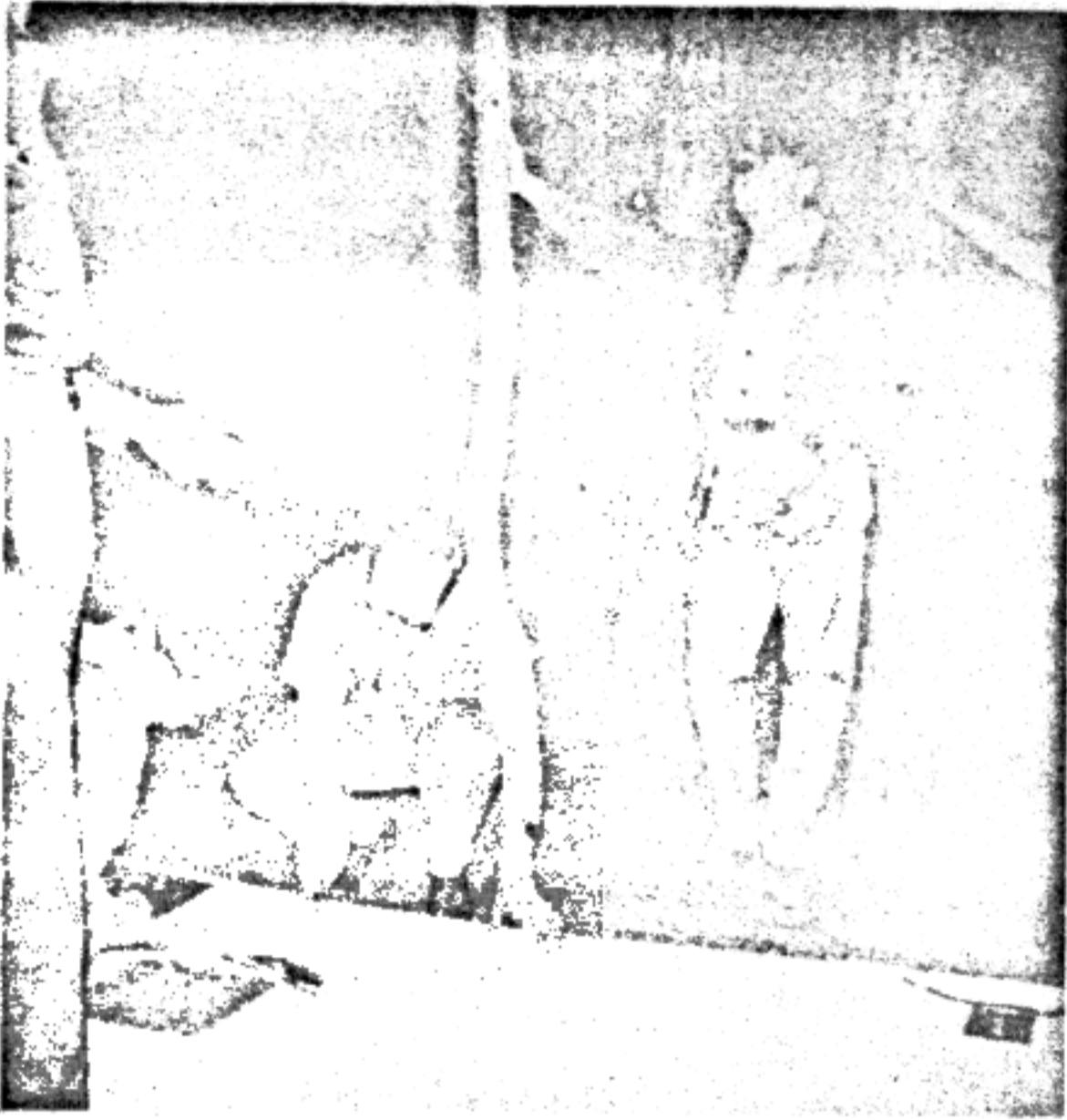


My brothers,

the Virginia Press Association made presentations for the most outstanding Newsletters in Area III-C. The KECOUGHTAN KRYER received 2nd Honorable Mention for its photo layouts and cover stories. First Place and the Area III-C Plaque went to Blue Heron's DRUMBEAT for the most outstanding overall layout and improvement during the past year.

The remainder of the afternoon was devoted to discussion groups and inspection of booths. At Saturday night's steak banquet Mr. Don R. Gaye was the speaker and he gave a talk on the responsibilities of an arrowman in his troop and lodge.

After supper Blue Heron held a Vigil rededication ceremony; and at 7:30 p.m. the camp fire and dance team competition began. Chanco Lodge held the opening ceremony and rededication ceremony. Kecoughtan's own Kenny Nourse did the Flaming Hoop dance which was the talk of the competition; and Kecoughtan's Dahcotal Dancers performed the Deer Quest.

After the dance competition everyone headed for the cracker barrel where a patch auction was soon to be held. Patch trading was going hot and heavy as everyone seemed to be trying to get as complete a set of III-C flaps as they could. The auction started not long thereafter and there was bidding left and right. One of our Kecoughtan Lodge 1969 Christmas Banquet Mugs went for \$3.00; and the highest bid for the evening was \$17.00 paid out for a Blue Heron jacket patch.

Sunday morning at 9:30 a.m. the III-C business meeting opened with the obligation. "Buddy" Burgess, Chief, and Buddy's father Chester W. Burgess, Adviser of Chanco Lodge, were lauded for the outstanding job Chanco Lodge had done in planning and running the Pow Wow. Kecoughtan Lodge Chief Larry Sutton gave the Lodge report and it was duly noted that Kecoughtan Lodge was a National Standard Lodge again this year.

Towards the end of the business meeting the presentation of awards for the competitive programs was held for the categories of Dance Team (solo and group) Display and Camping Promotion. In the

dance competition Koo Koo Ku Hoo Lodge came in first with their Oklahoma Dog Soldier dance and Kecoughtan came in second with the Deer Quest. For the solos, Blue Heron came in first with the Hoop dance and Koo Koo Ku Hoo second with their Ishi Bushi dance. For the display competition Shenandoah came in first with the theme Newsletters while Kecoughtan came in second with Year-Round Lodge Program. Camp promotions was led by Shenandoah followed by Shenshawpotoo.

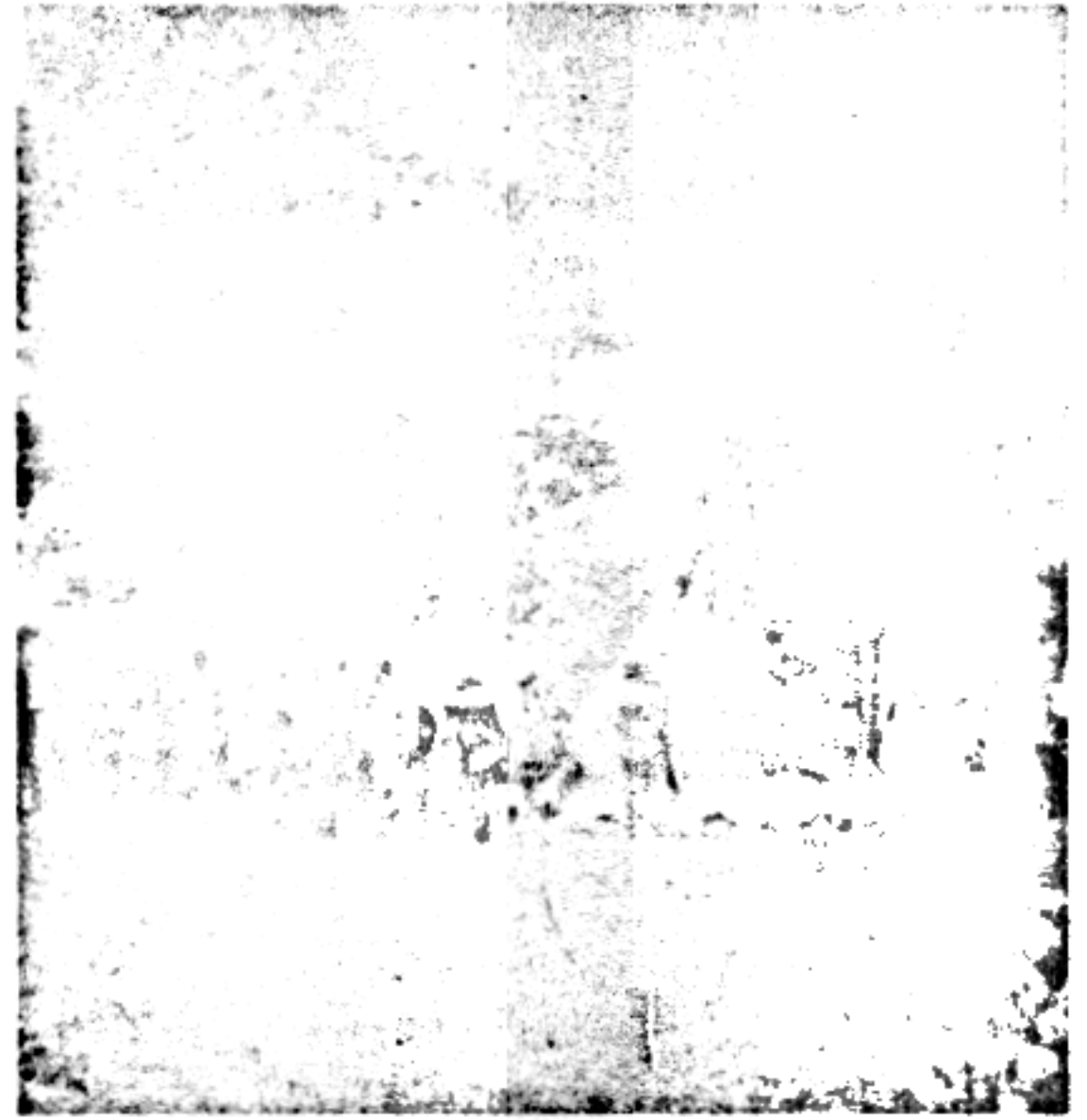
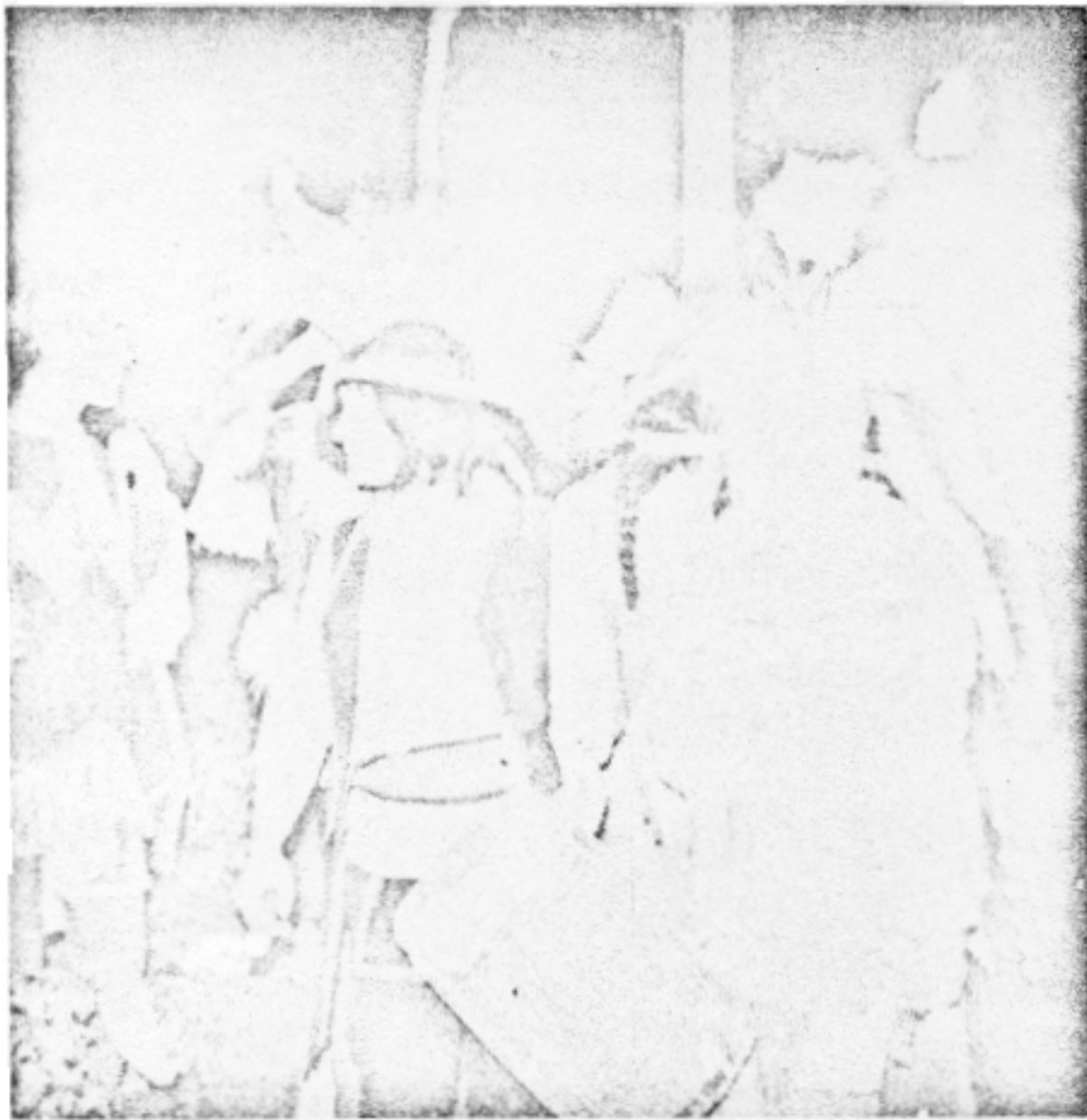
It was announced that the Kitchen Kabinet will be held at the Hot Shoppes in Richmond on 21 November 1970. The 56th Anniversary Order of the Arrow National Conference will be held at the University of Illinois, August 24-28, 1971.

The next item on the agenda was to decide who was to host the 1971 and '72 Pow Wows. Blue Heron voiced a bid for the 1971 Pow Wow, ran unopposed, and received the unanimous vote from the floor. Kecoughtan submitted a bid for the 1972 Pow Wow and was opposed by Shenshawpotoo. The 1st vote ended with Kecoughtan's 27 votes to Shenshawpotos 18. A second vote had to be taken since neither Lodge had a two-thirds majority of the votes. The second time Kecoughtan came up with 29 to 16; resulting in a third vote where the majority rules. Kecoughtan won the bid for the 1972 Pow Wow with a 34 to 11 vote.

The last item on the agenda was the Area elections. The nominees for Chief were Thomas Van Poole from the Amangamek Wipit Lodge, Bruce Waters, past Area Vice Chief, from the Nawakwa Lodge, and Tom Webb from Blue Heron. The elections opened with 5 votes going to Thomas Van Poole, 20 to Bruce Waters and 20 to Tom Webb. On the second vote Thomas Van Poole was dropped from the ballot leaving Tom Webb with 23 to Bruce Waters 22. Since neither candidate achieved a two thirds majority a third vote was taken. On the third vote Bruce Waters received 23 votes to Tom Webbs 22 thus leaving Bruce Waters Area III-C Chief. Next came the elections for Area Vice-Chief, Richard Bryant from Koo Koo Ku Hoo Lodge and Charley Prior from Amangamek Wipit Lodge were nominated by their lodges. Richard Bryant won the election with 25 votes to Prior's 20. After the new officers were installed there were presentations of III-C mugs to

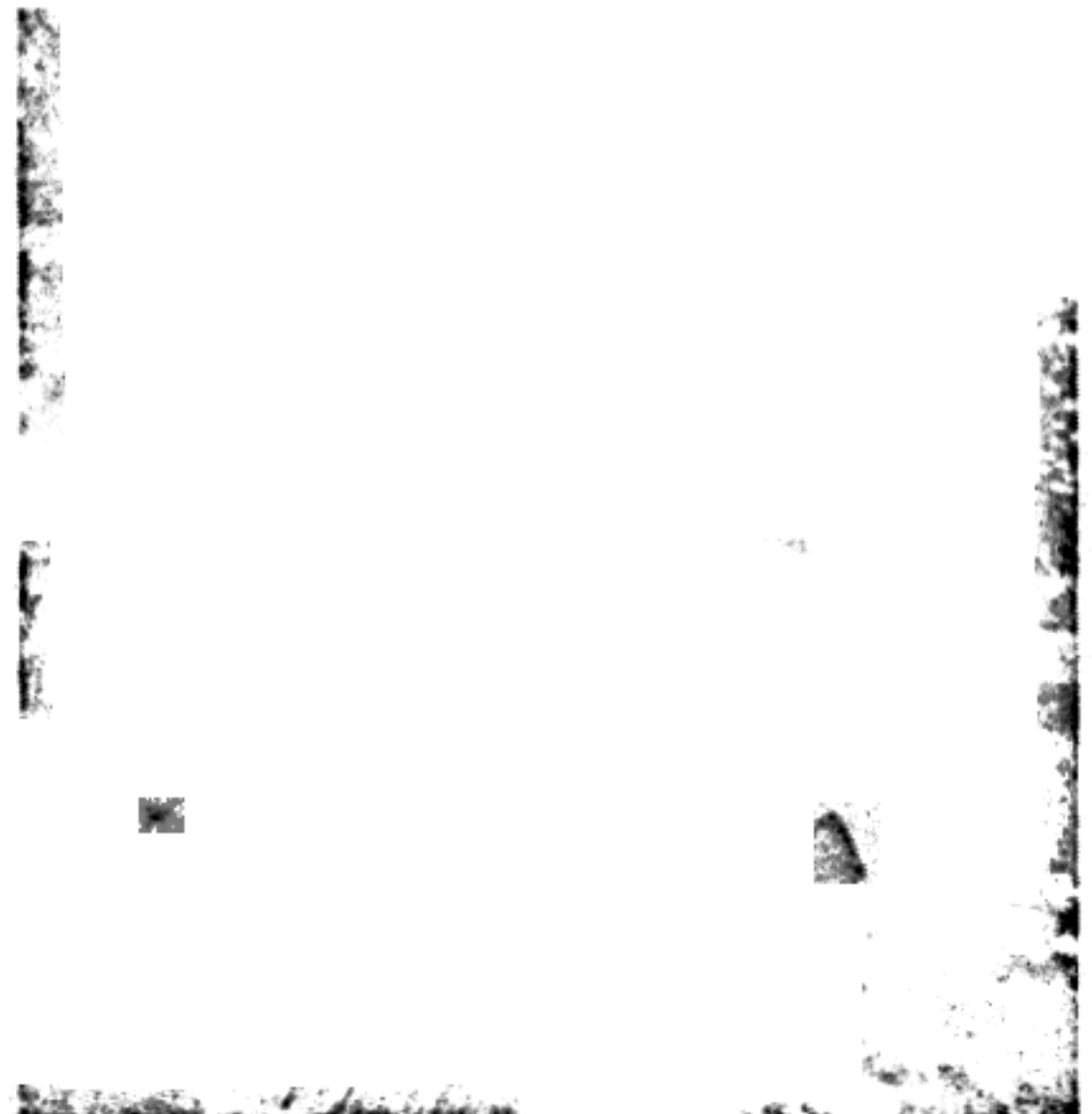

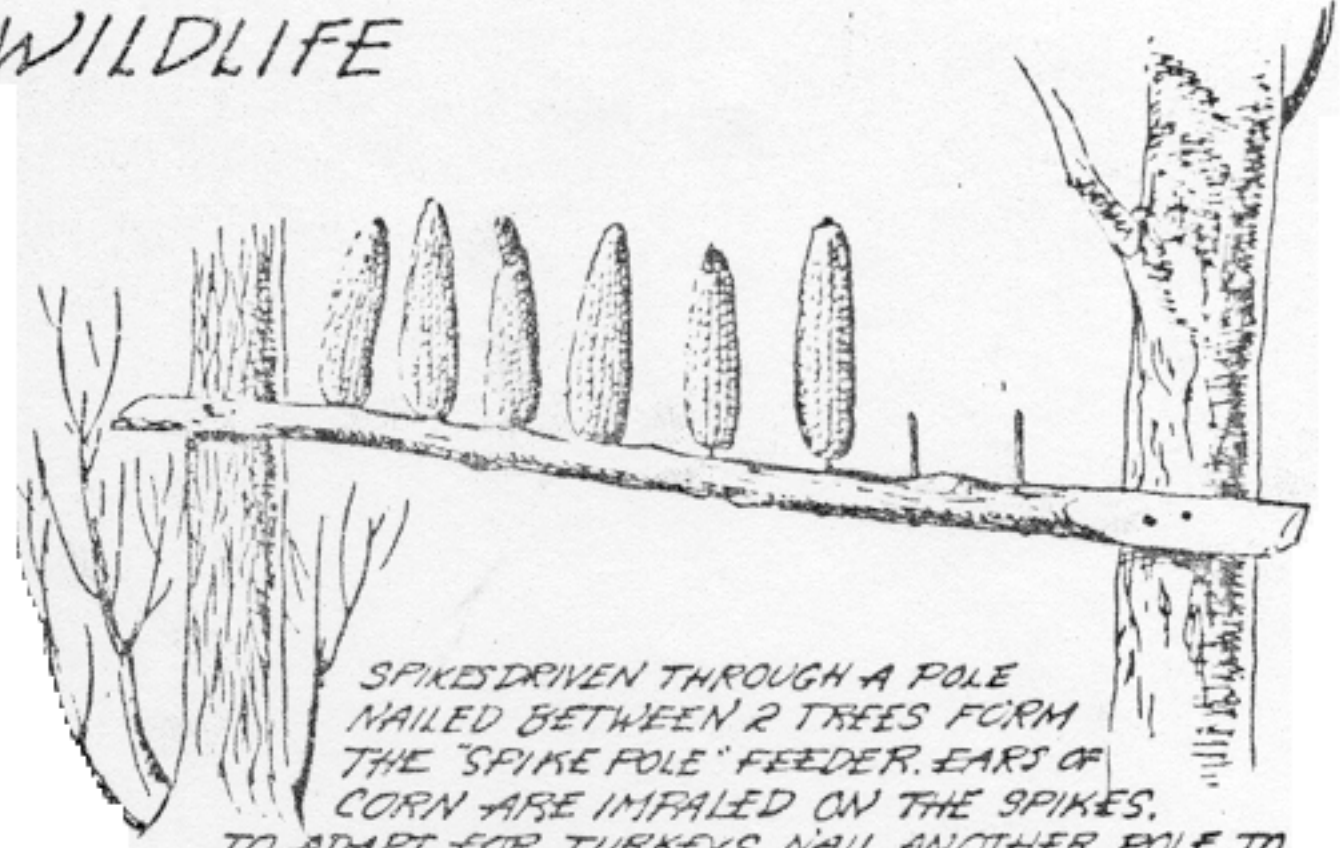
**ABOVE and BELOW:** The team prepares to start their competition group dance at the Area III-C Pow Wow. See story on page 1.



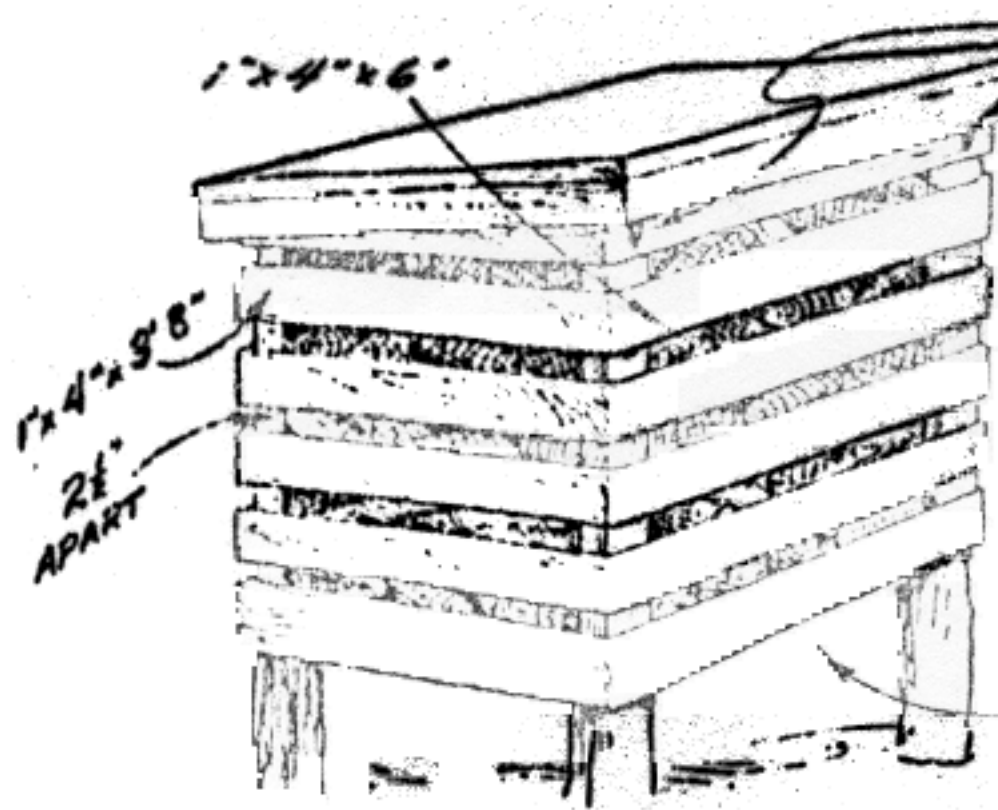
# CONSERVATION TIPS FOOD FOR WILDLIFE



HERE'S THE "STANDARD" FEEDING SHELTER FOR GAME. WHEN BUILT ON UNFROZEN GROUND IT CAN BE SUPPORTED BY FORMED STAKES INSTEAD OF TREES. CAN BE COVERED WITH CORN STALKS, BARK, OR BRUSH & LEAVES.



SPIKES DRIVEN THROUGH A POLE NAILED BETWEEN 2 TREES FORM THE "SPIKE POLE" FEEDER. EARS OF CORN ARE IMPALED ON THE SPIKES. TO ADAPT FOR TURKEYS NAIL ANOTHER POLE TO THE OTHER SIDE OF THE TREES, 12" BELOW THE FIRST.



THIS SOBU TURKEY FEEDER IS 36" DEEP AND SHOULD BE AT LEAST 16" ABOVE THE GROUND. LID IS HINGED FOR FILLING. SQUIRRELS STIR THE EAR CORN ABOUT, MAKING IT CONSTANTLY AVAILABLE TO THE TURKEYS.

BOTTOM CONSISTS OF 2" x 2" STRIPS SPACED 2" APART



THIS HOPPER FEEDER FOR SMALL GAME IS DEER-PROOFED BY ERECTING AROUND IT A 12'-14' SQUARE ROOF. THE ROOF IS ONLY 2 FT. ABOVE THE GROUND, TOO LOW TO ADMIT DEER. 4 STURDY POLES SET ON POSTS SUPPORT THE CROSS POLES & COVERING.

## COVER FOR WILDLIFE

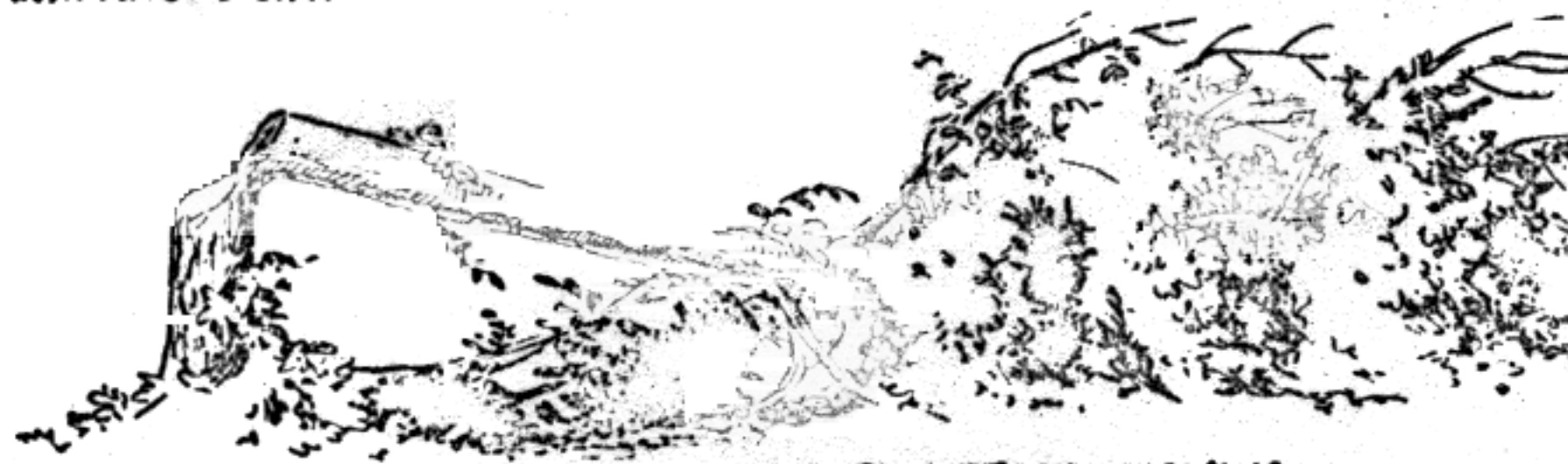


BRUSHPILES MAKE FINE ESCAPE COVER AND ENCOURAGE DENNING OF CHUCKS & FURBEARERS. HEAP BRUSH OVER STUMPS, ROCKS, LOGS OR RAIL PILES TO KEEP IT FROM MATTING DOWN

CUTAWAY VIEW SHOWING ARRANGEMENT OF STONES



BUILD THIS RETREAT FOR RABBITS & FURBEARERS BY LAYING ROCKS AS SHOWN, COVER WITH FLAT ROCKS OR DISCARDED SHEET IRON TO FORM TUNNELS 6" HIGH. COVER WITH EARTH, STONES & BRUSH.



FELL CULL TREES, ALLOWING THE BUTTS TO REMAIN ATTACHED TO A HIGH STUMP. PLANT JAPANESE HONEYSUCKLE OR OTHER FOOD OR COVER PRODUCING VINES OR SHRUBS. QUAIL WILL LOVE YOU FOR THIS!



WHERE NATURAL BURROWS ARE SCARCE ARTIFICIAL ONES CAN BE MADE BY BURYING OLD DRAIN TILES OR PIPES. HEAP PLENTY OF ROCKS & GROUND ON THE TILES LEAVING ENDS OPEN. ZIG-ZAG DESIGN FOILS THE "SPORTSMAN" WITH A STICK.



COVER FOR GROUSE AND OTHER SMALL GAME CAN BE ESTABLISHED BY FELLING UNWANTED TREES THAT ARE SUPPORTING WILD GRAPE VINES. IF CUT DURING THE SUMMER THE LEAVES WILL PROVIDE ADDITIONAL COVER.

**BROTHERHOOD QUESTIONNAIRE**  
**QUESTIONS FOR EXAMINATION OF CANDIDATES FOR**  
**BROTHERHOOD MEMBERSHIP**

**ORDER OF THE ARROW, BOY SCOUTS OF AMERICA**

1. Q. What is the name of initial membership in the Order of the Arrow?  
 A. *Ordeal membership.*
2. Q. Why is it so called?  
 A. *Because it is preceded by a fourfold Ordeal.*
3. Q. What are the four parts of this Ordeal and their respective purposes?  
 A. *A night of camping alone under the heavens, to prove my self-reliance; a day of arduous toil, to indicate my willingness to serve others; 24 hours of scant food, to demonstrate my power of self-denial; and a like period of silence, to turn my thoughts inward.*
4. Q. How were you prepared for the Ordeal?  
 A. *I was led by Kichkinet to the north end of the camp, where the significance of the Arrow was first revealed as I tested the bow.*
5. Q. When you had completed the Ordeal, how were you dealt with?  
 A. *I was placed on the trail which leads to the circle of the lodge.*
6. Q. By whom were you first stopped as you approached the circle?  
 A. *By Nutiket, the guard, who asked if I had passed the Ordeal without flinching.*
7. Q. Who next barred your further progress?  
 A. *Meteu, who inquired if I had been given the admonition.*
8. Q. Had you been given the admonition?  
 A. *I had not, but Kichkinet, my guide, had and gave it for me.*
9. Q. Before whom did you then at last arrive?  
 A. *Before Allowat Sakima, the Chief of the Fire, who asked if I had been completely prepared to receive the Obligation.*
10. Q. What was Kichkinet's reply to this inquiry?  
 A. *Only in the binding of them together.*
11. Q. How did Kichkinet call the attention of each of these officers to your presence?  
 A. *By three taps of the hand upon the right shoulder.*
12. Q. What did these three taps signify?  
 A. *The three parts of the Scout Oath or Promise.*
13. Q. How did each of the officers respond to Kichkinet's taps?  
 A. *By one tap, followed by two taps, on the right shoulder.*
14. Q. What did these taps represent?  
 A. *The 12 points of the Scout Law.*
15. Q. How were you and your companions bound together?  
 A. *By a rope, which, until we took the Obligation, represented our tie to the brotherhood.*
16. Q. How was your preparation for the Obligation completed?  
 A. *Nutiket directed me to hold my right hand at the Scout sign and repeat the Obligation after Allowat Sakima.*

17. Q. Repeat the Obligation.

A. *I do hereby promise on my honor as a Scout, that I will always and faithfully observe and preserve the traditions of the Order of the Arrow, WIMACHTENDIENK, WINGOLAUCHSIK, WITAHEMUI, which I have now received. I will always regard the ties of Brotherhood in the Order of the Arrow as lasting, and will seek to preserve a cheerful spirit even in the midst of irksome tasks and weighty responsibilities, and will endeavor, so far as in my power lies, to be unselfish in service and devotion to the welfare of others.*

18. Q. In what did Meteu then instruct you?  
 A. *In the legend upon which our Order is founded.*
19. Q. Who are the central figures of that legend?  
 A. *The aged Chieftain, Chingachgook, and his son, Uncas, who by their cheerful and self-sacrificing service, are said to have saved the Delaware lodges from annihilation.*
20. Q. What did Allowat Sakima then impart to you?  
 A. *The symbol and handclasp of the Order, the admonition and the sign of Ordeal membership.*
21. Q. What is the symbol of the Order?  
 A. *The arrow, whose undeviating course when aimed high is a token of leadership.*
22. Q. How is it worn?  
 A. *Pointing over the right shoulder.*
23. Q. Give me the handclasp of our Order.  
 A. *(Give it.)*
24. Q. How must the admonition always be given?  
 A. *Whispered in the ear.*
25. Q. What is the admonition?  
 A. *(Give it.)*
26. Q. What does it mean?  
 A. *To love one another.*
27. Q. What is the sign of the Ordeal?  
 A. *(Give it.)*
28. Q. What is the full name of our Order?  
 A. *Wimachtendienk, Wingolauchsik, Witahemui.*
29. Q. In what language is it given?  
 A. *In the language of the Delaware Indians, the Lenni Lenape.*
30. Q. What is its meaning in English?  
 A. *The Brotherhood of Cheerful Service.*
31. Q. Give the words (or sing) the Song of the Order.  
 A. *Firm bound in Brotherhood, gather the clan,  
 That cheerful service brings to fellow man,  
 Circle our council fire, weld tightly every link,  
 That binds us in Brotherhood, W's-mach-ten-dienk.*

## Chapters Move Up

New responsibilities will be assumed by the Chapters at the September 11-13 1970 Summer Ordeal-Fellowship. As a logical development of chapter integrity, the Lodge Executive Committee approved the changes at its July 9<sup>th</sup> meeting. Briefly, each Chapter will take full responsibility for all of its members AND CANDIDATES, with only 2 exceptions. The Lodge Cooking Committee will continue its excellent work, and the Lodge Ceremonial Committee retains responsibility for all ceremonies, including the overnight portion of the Ordeal.

Each Chapter will: (1) Appoint an Ordeal Master to coordinate with the Lodge Ordeal Master. (2) Take charge of a specific numbered campsite and an appropriate share of the rest of camp to insure their proper usage and condition during and at the conclusion of the Ordeal-Fellowship weekend. (3) Require all members and candidates to register with the Chapter Secretary upon arrival at Camp Chickahominy, urging all members to camp in their own Chapter Campsite and insuring that they camp only in a Chapter campsite. (4) Deliver its Ordeal Candidates to the Lodge Ceremonial Committee at the appointed time on Friday night and resume custody of them on Saturday morning. (5) On Friday night, put into final form the service crew and service assignments which will have been pre-planned by the Ordeal Masters. (Service Crews will consist of integrated teams containing members, Ordeal Candidates, and Brotherhood Candidates to the extent each type is available) (6) Supervise, through its Ordeal Master and his Taskmasters, the service crews in their Saturday service assignments. (7) Coach, examine and certify Brotherhood Candidates. (8) At designated times on Saturday, assemble all Ordeal Candidates in campsite #1 for orientations. (9) Insure that all Ordeal Candidates' tents are pitched in their Chapter campsite before dark on Saturday. (10) Assemble all members, old and new for the scheduled Sunday business meeting and orientation. (11) At the conclusion of the

Ordeal-Fellowship Weekend, accomplish whatever cleaning may be necessary to leave its assigned areas in better condition than they were received.

These may seem to be weighty responsibilities. If they seem so, remember the words of our Obligation. Properly executed, they will make each Ordeal-Fellowship Weekend more pleasant for all who attend and, most important they will weld tightly the links of brotherhood that bind a Chapter together.

There are 3 events each year which relate to administration of the Order of the Arrow on a scale above the council level.

If your number is 600 or lower, the answer is, "YES!"

Look carefully. The number is a new one, just issued, because the Lodge is so big we have to tighten up the numbers periodically or we would run over the machine limit.

Also, note carefully your CHAPTER. (in front of your Troop number) It may have changed to conform to the Peninsula Scout District changes. If you go to your meetings in Williamsburg, James City Co., York Co., or Poquoson, your Chapter is "1". If you go in Gloucester or Mathews Counties, it is "2". If you meet in Newport News, your Chapter is "3"; and if Hampton is where your action is, you are in Chapter "4".

Each year the lodge elected officers (5 boys) attend an Area III-C planning session on the third Saturday in November. Also, the Area III-C Pow Wow is held the fourth weekend of April every year. That involves approximately 25 boys, the lodge elected officers and committee chairmen, chapter chiefs, and the most proficient Indian dancers. On alternate years, Area III-C and National Training Conferences are held. They draw about the same boys as the Pow Wows, additional Chapter Officers being substituted for Indian dancers. Because of the small number of boys involved, these 3 annual O. A. functions are not completely integrated with District calendars. For instance, this year's Area III-C Training Conference coincides with the Western District Junior Leader Training Session. If a senior boy is needed on JLT staff, we expect him to put that first in his priorities. On the other hand, the younger Arrowmen who still require Junior Leader Training are not ready for O. A. Training at the Area level.
