




to attend.





TAKE A GOOD LOOK

Is this you? This description fits most of us in one way or another, unfortunately. Consider that everywhere we see a building and sidewalk, we are in reality looking at the former homes of plants and animals. Consider that breeding places for pests, and thus ecological unbalance, is encouraged every time we throw trash and garbage into the Bay from boats and piers. Did you know that we breath in air that is no longer pure? Every year, the two hundred million citizens of the United States throw 48 billion rust-proof cans into the landscape, not to mention the 26 billion nodeposit, no-return bottles we discard each year. We can't continue this trend. Thes figures are unfortunately all too correct. It is up to you to collect them. Read this page every issue and find out how you can aid in the campaign.

from the little acorn ...

You Bet! Have you noticed little acorns sprouting under large oak trees around your home? Did you know that you can store them over the winter and plant them in the spring to make borders or to improve your yard, church grounds, etc? Here's How.

First collect the healthy, semi-shiny, sprouting acorns found most likely under large accumulations of leaves under or near the parent tree. You can store them buried about a foot below ground, level between layers of gravel, or plant them indoors until spring.

Around March 15th, soak the acorns in water for about an hour, make a two inch slit in the ground with a shovel and place the acorn in the bottom. Plant the seedlings so that the ground level is the same as when the seedling was indoors and the roots are spread. Keep them well watered. For more information see your Fieldbook.

Splendid wilderness area on Queen Creek outside the Camp Peary fence, but within the fenced military reservation area. Totally primitive except for water trailer furnished by Camp Peary on basis of prior reservation. Area is patrolled at night by military police; and daytime security is sufficient for safety of tentage and equipment while hiking or fishing and clamming. APPLE BETTY

Put down 1 inch alternating layers of cornflakes and apple sauce sprinkled with sugar and a little nutmeg or cinnamon. Two #303 cans of apple sauce should do it for a Patrol with good appetites. If you want it hot, put the ingredients in a frying pan, dot the top with margarine, and bake in a dutch oven for about 20 minutes.

BACON PANCAKES

2 cups flour 6 slices bacon
5 tsps baking powder 2 cups milk
2 tsps salt 6 tsps shortening

3 tsps sugar 2 eggs

First, mix baking powder and flour, salt, and sugar together and set aside. In a mixing bowl or large pot, beat eggs; add milk; and stir in the shortening and the mixed dry ingredients. Stir well until all ingredients are completely blended. Crumpble in the previously cooked bacon. Stir well again. Lightly grease a hot griddle and start cooking. Makes 30 hot-cakes 4 to 5 inches wide, or a dozen real Paul B. cakes big as the small trail chef skillet. (NOTE: store-bought mix can be used instead of the dry ingredients)

NEW MEMBERSHIP RULES

Since the election rules were last changed in 1967, it has become quite evident that some underserving Scouts and Scouters have been elected to the Order of the Arrow. One proof is in the number who go through the Ordeal but promptly quit. Throughout the Boy Scouts of America, responsible and prominent people in the Order recognized the problem and vowed to check up on it.

The success of their search was made known to the delegates of the 1970 Area III-C Training Institute as Dave Boshea, National Order of the Arrow Secretary, told them or what were at that time tentative changes in both quotas and procedures. At that time, they had not been given final approval by The Chief Scout Executive and Supreme Chief of the Fire of the National Lodge, Alden G. Barber. All delegates agreed that the rules should be stricter. and that the proposed changes were nec- ; essary. The changes revealed by Mr. Boshea were subsequently approved by M. . . . Barber; and we received the official release copies of the Chief Scout Executive's bulletin on November 10, 1970. Kecoughtan Lodge's Executive Committee approved their immediate adoption, and lifted the freeze that had been imposed on unit elections since September 1, 1970. All unit elections had been frozen in the 1970-71 election year because we had been informed that the changes were field-tested in several lodges across the country last summer and were being put into final form.

Now that the new rules are published, all brothers must become familiar with them.

DO NOT USE YOUR O A HANDBOOK FOR ANY KIND OF INFORMATION ABOUT ELIGIBILTY OR ELECTIONS. Read on for a brief resume of the new rules, so we may assure ourselves that future improvements in loyal support to the principles of CHEERFUL SERVICE ABOVE SELF may be forthcoming.

Approval of the Unit Leader BEFORE
the names are presented to the
members of the unit for voting.

- 2. EVERY person approved by the Unit Leader must:
 - a. Truly represent the ideals of Scouting in his daily life;
 - b. Be a First Class Scout ON THAT

 DATE (note the change in when
 he has to be First Class!)

 (No rank requirement for Explorers, but must have been active
 Explorers at least six months);
 - c. Have at least 15 days and nights of B.S.A. camping which must include one long-term camp of not less than 6 consecutive days within the past two years
- Fifty percent of the unit must be at the meeting for an election to be held.
- 4. Unit members (boys under age 18 only) do not have to turn in ballots if do not want to; and they can vote for fewer than the quota.
- 5. To be elected, a boy's name must be on at least 50 percent of the ballots that are turned in.
- 6. The new quotas take into consideration not only active unit registration, but also the number of eligible boys who are not already in the O.A.
- 7. Boy (under 21) Assistant Scoutmasters are considered to be adults for election purposes. They may not vote in troop boy elections. They may not be elected by boys. They may be elected by the Troop Committee, but only on the same basis as other unit adults: one per year per unit.
- 8. Explorers under the age of 21 are governed by the boy election rules and quotas. (except Associate Advisors)

NOTE: There has been NO CHANGE in the boy - adult definitions with regard to other O.A. matters.

Thank you very much for your assistance. "He alone is worthy to wear the arrow, who will continue faithfully to serve his fellow men."



Don't Just Meet: Do (But Not Too Much)

Experience has proved the lodges that keep general lodge and chapter meetings at a minimum will have better attendance. Experience also shows that the most active and successful lodges are those that offer service opportunities and are actively involved in helping units and the council.

It is recommended that general lodge meetings be held semiannually when the majority of lodge members can attend. Such times might be during the Christmas holidays and in the summer.

C arterly meetings of chapters should be sufficient to keep members up-to-date.

Local lodge officers direct activities through their monthly executive committee meetings. The actual work of the lodge happens through the lodge or chapter committee meetings—not general meetings. The frequency of committee meetings is determined by the work to be done and the time of the year. Arrowmen are expected to first give service to and be active in their own Boy Scout troops or Explorer posts, then they can assist the lodge in such activities as unit elections, camp promotion, service to council camping facilities, etc.

In addition, Arrowmen have other outside and school interests and activities so they will not be interested in attending numerous lodge and chapter meetings.

Another warning about lodge and chapter activities: Don't try to schedule too many ceremonies, tap outs, inductions, rehearsals, or fellowships either.

Doing is better than just meeting but not too much, please! Okay?
