PROGRAM

"If Scouting is to make the kind of contribution to this country over the next decade that it has for the past 60 years, it mustbe sensitive to the real needs of our youth everywhere. We must look at both our strengths and weaknesses if we are to meet the challanges of BOYPOWER 76, and develop a program that can be interpreted within our current organization." These lines are taken from the opening of "Challenge For Boy Scouting", a series of changes put forth by National for the Boy Scouting Program.

There are three ingredients in this new program. They are 1) Basic Skill Awards 2) earlier introduction to meret badges 3) the personal growth agreement conferences. Terminolgy has been changed somewhat, the word rank has been changed to "Progress Award", and the word Scout will become official instead of Boy Scout in everything except the name of the organization.

Of the twelve basic skill awards, eight of a Scout's choice will be completed by First Class. The Citizenship Skill Award is required for Tenderfoot, and the other eleven are: Camping, Hiking, Cooking, First Aid, Conservation, Environmental, Swimming, Physical Fitness, Communications, Family Living and Community Living. These skill awards will make it possible for handicapped Scouts to earz ranks Progress Awards without any big hassle. Just as it is now, qualified Scouts or Adults may pass off these skill awards, but the requirements are published in a pocket sized individual booklets and the belt loop award may: be presented on the spot, at troop meetings or at court of honer.

Another major change is that Scouts must be actively in Scouts for a minimum of 24 months before recieving Eagle.

Requirements for tenderfoot are now 1)
two months active service 2) Repeat Scout Oath
andLaw 3) Earn Citizenship and one other skill
award 4) Earn one merit badge 5) Personal
growth agreement.

CHANGES

Second Class requirements are 1) 3
months active service 2) demonstrate
Scout spirit 3) earn three additional
skill awards 4) earn two additional merit
badges 5) personal growth agreement conference. First Class requirement(By the
time a Scout is First Class he will have
earned five merit badges including First
Aid and Citizenship in the Community.)

The only significant changes for the Star Progress Award are four months active service and four additional merit badges including two required for Eagle. Changes for the Life Progress Award include six months active service and six additional merit badges including three required for Eagle.

The only significant change in Eagle is to earn nine additional merit badges including all of the following:

Citizenship in the Community
Citizenship in the Nation
Citizenship in the World
Communications
Personal Management
Personal Fitness or Swimming or sports
Safety
Emergency Preparedness or Lifesaving
Environmental Science

That's right! Big Blue is here! It is the new (and now the only) Unit Elections Report. It has been revised to show the information required by the present Unit Elections Rules. These rules place great emphasis on counts that were not required under the old rules. For instance, now a very important count is "Number of ballots turned in." We never had to think about that before. Now it controls the number of votes a boy must receive to be elected. The new report form therefore both helps the election team in conducting the election, and allows the chairmen who review election reports to better determine that the election was held correctly.

REMEMBER: Those old yellow forms are no good at all. You cannot hold an election without the BLUE FORM -- and you cannot get a set of blue forms until you are trained in using them. Del Croom is the guy to see.
