


Sunday, after breakfast, Chapel was held in the Dining Hall with Jim Proctor-The Cragmont Man- as guest preacher.



## INDIAN 1977 SEMINAR

The 1977 Indian Seminar was held at Camp Powhatan in the Blue Ridge Mountains near Hiwasee, Va. The SE1 Seminar was hosted by Tutelo Lodge. Upon arrival at camp, which was made in three groups(since the three groups departed seperately), we proceeded up the main, and only road, for what seemed like 10 miles. We finally arrived at the parking lot, walked up the road some more, checked in at the admin. building, and eventually found our campsite. Later on in the evening of Friday, there ensued patch trading like never before seen. After that there was a huge cracker barrel where everyone went back again and again.

Saturday morning started off with a large breakfast of scrammbled eggs and bacon. After breakfast there was a flag ceremony that almost didn't go off as planned. The Head-honcho guy gave the order "SCOUT SALUTE" and after about 15 minutes when the flag still had not been raised, nearly everyone

had put their arms down. The flag was finally raised and everyone gave a big sigh of relief. Then it was on to the different activities that had been planned for the day. There was a session on Ceremonial ideas, sessions on Straight, Old Time, and Fancy Dancing, Indian History, Council of Chiefs, and last but most important, the N.A.C. (Newsletter Advisory Committee). In the afternoon sessions Old, Fancy, and Straight Dancing were demonstrated again. Later in the day there was competition between the ceremonial teams of the different LOdges that had representatives there.

Kecoughtan Lodge won overall since it was the only Lodge to have a com plete team. In the Individual Ceremonial Parts Competition Kevin Hopkins won as Allowat-Sakima, and Joe Carroll, who is at V.P.I., won as Meteu.

Lunch was not too great for the money. The N.A.C. worked 14 hours on Saturday from 10 am. till 12 pm. From comments by Brothers who had attended the first two Seminars, there was a reaction that this years newsletter was the best ever put out. Dinner on Saturday night was average. The only desert that we had was two cookies at each meal.

Immediately after supper there was a fire circle. After the fire circle there was the group dance competition in which Amangamek-Wipit won top honors. Immediately following the group dance competition there was the solo dance competition in which Blue Heron Lodge won first place. In the Pow-Wow, which came after solo dancing, Shenandoah took first place. Amangamek-Wipit won the group dance with the Chippawa Pipe Dance; Blue Heron won solo with the Eagle Dance; Pow-Wow was won by JimJones. The winners of the day's competition were announced at the Saturday night crackerbarrel.

Sunday morning after Reveille there was breakfast in the dining hall which was pretty good. After the Chapel service, the closing was held on the parade grounds. We broke camp at around 11:00 and returned home at approximately 7:30 pm.

All in all I believe that it was a very informative weekend for everyone who went to this Adventure in Brotherhood and I hope that the Conclave coming up will be even better.
