FROM THE FOREST.... SMOKESIGNALS DOWN MEMORY LANE IN #463

The Lodge started a newsletter in December 1962. Allen Harvester of Troop 31 designed the letterhead. It was sixteen years ago during a meeting that the idea of a newsletter was born. Although the newsletter was still young, in 1968 Cliff Sleeman of Troop 49 accepted the Virginia Press Association Award for the best Order of the Arrow Newsletter in Area 3-C. The Kryer always played a big part in the lodge as its foremost communication. In 1971, Sam Fairchild of Troop 345, accepted the Virginia Press Association Award for the most outstanding newsletter in the Section. And again in 1972 Sam won the competition as the best newsletter in the Section. The Lodge was number 1 in those years in the area. Yes, the Kryer was number 1 in those years also. In 1975 Tommy and Dicky Wiggs, won the newsletter competition as the best newsletter in the Section 1 area. We should be proud of her history as our lodge Kryer. The Kryer has had its ups and downs and a lot of changes have been made since that first issue. Some editors have published the Kryer with pride and some were less proud looking at it only as a job to be done. We are now on Volume 17, number 2, in sixteen years and have come a long way since that first newsletter. On Friday, November 17, 1978, the group of delegates of the National Leadership Seminar and the Section Indian Seminar left together in cars for the Seminar in Norfolk at the Navy Amphibious Base hosted by Blue Heron Lodge. (We all made a detour--case of a mis-turn.) We all arrived at the same time. After registration for the Seminar, we broke into our groups and going our different ways, proceeded to our Navy quarters, bunk beds. Since we had the largest delegation at the Leadership Seminar, 10 brothers, we got two sections together. We had a schedule that was a lot like our LOT 78. After making our beds, we ran to catch the bus. Opening speeches were conducted at our training center, then first session started with the History and Purposes of the Order of the Arrow by Thomas G. McBridge and Ken P. Davis of the National OA Committee. The second session was on the National Update by Don Thom of the National OA Committee. After the two sessions, we went to a Crackerbarrel that was great! We had fellowship with lodges all over the southeast section area. Meeting scouts out of our own section was great--talking with them, learning new things for each other's lodge. It was late when we got to bed and Gus heard it from Chico. On Saturday we got up, looked at the time, got dressed, ran to the bus which was to take us to breakfast. We had ham and eggs and man that ham was good! After eating a big breakfast, we all left for our classes. The third session was on OA Key Three by Dave Worland, Southeast Region Chief. The Key Three are the Chief, the Lodge Adviser, and Professional and they do have a big job in the lodge. The Professional does a lot in a lodge. After a short break, we broke up into groups that were A, B, C, or D. I was put into Group B along with Barry. We started at session five which was Program by two members in our very own section, Dave Barringer of Amangamekwipit and George Homewood of Nawakwa. They went into why plan for a program and asked our group to make a plan for the year as a sample to teach us the importance of planning. After that session, a short walk to lunch where you could eat from hamburgers to hot dogs, applie pie to jello. They had many different choices; I had chicken and rice and apple pie and ice cream. After lunch we left for the next session. As we



walked to the building, it began to rain. We were wet but for a short time. At our next session which was number four--Communications by Wes Morgan of Area-3A which is North Carolina, we were given two simple newsletters, one page, to compare and tell what needed to be changed to be a good, informative newsletter. He then went into qualities of a good newsletter and editor. After that session, we went into sessions eight and nine which were in halves. First half was problem solving by Sam Jones, Region OA Com. Secretary. He showed us how to solve a problem when one comes up in a lodge. He then gave us six different problems to solve. It was something different in training for me. After that, we went to dinner. Barry Spread and I had dinner with the National OA Chief, Chris Boswell and lunch with Southeast Region Chief, Dave Worland. After a delicious dinner of lamb, green salad and strawberry short cake, we walked back to the second half which was Section Officers by Jim Borsig, Southeast Region Committee. This session was on officers duties, who on Council of Chiefs meetings has a vote and who does not. After learning about the section officers, we went into a new session that was session six on Lodge Administration by Graig Bass, Southeast 3B of South Carolina and Rick Burton, National Vice Chief. That was a great session on Administration. They showed us how the Lodge Administration works, who was on the Administration, what can and cannot a Chapter do. Council of Chief's

Mike Wagner, Area Chief, called the meeting to order with the Obligation, Welcoming, and Introduction of Sections following. The Secretary called the Roll of Lodges. Three Lodges were not represented. The Secretary read the minutes of the April 23, 1978, Business Meeting. Various reports of the officers, committees and lodges followed.

Gus Diggs, our Chief, had so many good things to report about our Lodge that he went over the three-minute limit. The Chief told him to sit down.

The final 1978 Conclave Report was given by Gus Diggs. He thanked everybody for a great turnout; the financial report for the Conclave finished in the black. Host of the 1979 Conclave gave its reports on how the Conclave was progressing. The budget was not approved due to incompleteness; therefore, they will present the budget at the Indian Seminar.

The Council of Chiefs reconvened on the 18th of November at the Indian Seminar.

The theme was announced for the 1979 Conclave - "The Dawn of a New Horizon". The Conclave co-ordinator will be Doug Detrick from Nawakwa Lodge.

The meeting started late at 10:30 PM with the primary concern being the budget for the 1979 conclave. The budget submitted by the host lodge, Nawakwa, was dissaproved by every other lodge in attendance. After much debate and discussion Shenandoah Lodge introduced a revised budget that was finally approved by every lodge but Nawakwa.

Next was business to determine who will host next years Indian Seminar. Bids were opened on the floor and Nentico Lodge accepted as host for the Indian Seminar. Approval was given by the other lodges.

Mike Wagner introduced a proposal to raise money for the sections operations by selling baseball caps with emblems on them. No decision was made and the chief was to look further into the proposal and report to the lodges at the next meeting.

The meeting was adjourned at 1:30 AM and all delegates gratefully went to bed.
