



Until recently, to be a member of the Order of the Arrow, you must have been a registered member of a scouting unit, explorer unit, a district or council scouter. Not so anymore! If you are not active as a scout or scouter but want to remain affiliated with the scouting movement, you can now register as a "Scout Alumnus" (at the Council office). By registering you remain eligible to retain your membership in the Order of the Arrow. Many scouts away at college and older scouters at home with medical problems are now assured of maintaing continuous scouting and O/A registration and can receive bulletins, newsletters and other information even though not an active unit member.




Fellow Brothers,






On Saturday, March 3, 1979, five brothers from Kecoughtan Lodge left the Scout Service Center at 7:30 a.m. headed for the Council of Chief's meeting in Fredericksburg, VA. Those attending were Bill Leighty, Gus Diggs, Tim Ewing, Morris Friedman, and Mike Myers. Mike Wagner, Area Chief, called the meeting to order with the obligation; welcoming, and introduction of sections followed. The secretary called the Roll of Lodges. Two lodges were not represented. The secretary read the minutes of the November 18, 1978, Business Meeting.

Various reports of the officers, committees and lodges followed. The 1978 Indian Seminar final report was given; also, a special report containing all the good and bad comments of the previous four seminars was presented. Morris Friedman reported for Kecoughtan's delegation to the Indian seminar. His report was taken from the December Lodge minutes. The 1978 Leadership Seminar Report was next. All the lodges reported that the training was great. Mike Wagner stated that George Homewood and Dave Barringer . received most points for the best trainers. Bids for the N.L.S. for 1980 were up for grabs. Kecoughtan Lodge requested to host the N.L.S. in 1980. Gus Diggs then called on George Homewood, to tell about the plans for the Leadership Seminar. George stated that it will be at William and Mary College in Williamsburg, VA. More details will be in the next Kryer issue. Mike said, he will make a bid for the N.L.S. at the next regional meeting. The conclave was next on the agenda. Doug Derrick gave a report on how the conclave was shapeing-up. He gave a good report. He did his homework!

It looks as if the conclave hosted by Nawakwa will be a good one. Doug then went down the list on lodge delegation quotas. He stated that Kecoughtan was the only lodge to get payments in on time.

The committees that judges the competitions went over the rules of camping promotion, lodge display, newsletter, volleyball, and Gong Show. All the lodges said they were going to participate. Kecoughtan was asked what we were doing for the Gong Show. Tim Ewing stated we were going to give everyone a thrill by

Lodge designers are asked to send their pencil drawings in by conclave. Our section once again has earned the Standard Section Award.

The 1979 National O.A. Conference will be held August 13-17. The section is flying out of Dulles Airport. Amangamek-Wipit is working on travel plans. It was voted at the last Council of Chiefs meeting to travel together.

Two awards were presented to Amangamet-Wipit for winning the ceremony and dance team competition at Indian Seminar.

The section Lay Adviser, Mr. Pete Price, give his closing remarks followed by Mike Wagner's closing remarks. The Council of Chiefs meeting was closed by forming our friendship circle and singing our song.

XV World Jamboree in Iran Postponed. The XV World Jamboree, scheduled to be held next July in Iran, has been postponed until 1983. However, members of the Boy Scouts of America planning to attend the international event will have options. The World Committee tried hard to find an alternative location for the World Jamboree, BUT because of the magnitude of the organizing task and the shortness of time, the attempt was unsuccessful. To maintain the rhythm of an international jamborees, and to enable as many boys as possible to experience the world brotherhood of an international camp, the World Committee decided to: Designate 1979 as a World Jamboree Year. Recognize major camps with significant international participation as "World Jamboree Year Camps." Encourage the promotion of the "Join in Jamboree"theme for smaller camps and events throughout 1979 to help spread the spirit of international Scout brotherhood. The National Council of the B.S.A. is working with the World Bureau on developing optioal plans and will advise councils and participants, who had signed up for the Iranian world jamboree, as soon as plans are firmed. Some options are already available to Scouts who had planned to go to Iran are alternatives to go to three Canadian jamborees- the Toronto Regional, the British Columbia Yukon, and the Manitoba Provincial jamborees- all scheduled in July. In addition, there are the European Friendship Tour (July 6-26, 1979, Cost: \$1,000 per person) and the 12th Australian Jamboree. combined with the 4th Asia-Pacific (Dec. 20, 1979-Jan. 12, 1980, cost: \$1,500 per person). 



















Winter Ordeal Continue

With the business meeting recessed until Sunday morning, the ceremonies began. Five ordeal members, having fulfilled the requirements for brotherhood, were presented their sash. The ordeal ceremony followed the brotherhood ceremony and nineteen candidates were inducted into our lodge. Awaiting in the dining hall was a great crackerbarrel of pizza, crackers, pickles, cheese, a variety of lunch meats, olives and hot chocolate. With the crackerbarrel in full swing, that 'she world famous auctioneer, from the Pamunkey Chapter, Dan Thompson, began the annual winter ordeal patch auction. The auction netted \$127.85 for the E. Bailey Tudder camp maintenance fund. Morris "Cat" Friedman was the highest bidder for a single patch, paying \$5.25 for a Kecoughtan 1972 Pow Wow patch.

It was evident that everyone must have really put in a hard days work as the entire camp slept like logs the whole night through. (No raids). As a relatively new Ranger for this council, I am continually meeting people who have no idea who, what, or where I am. This article is intended to clear up these questions and to help you better understand exactly where I stand in regard to the O.A. and this area.

I do not fit the general discription of the typical camp ranger, if one exist. I am 26 years old, but my experience ranges into a broad number of fields. I am not an expert at any particular subject but I find that my greatest asset is the ability to work with people. My wife, Diane, and I have been married a little over a year. I am 6'5" tall. My favorite color is dark blue. Now that you know all that you ever wanted to know about the ranger you can stop reading at this point and go on to a more interesting article like the life history of Andy Hess on page 3.

I was inducted into Powhatan Lodge in 1968. I worked with that Lodge and their council, camp, Camp Powhatan, for 10 years. I was also involved in the planning and the building of the High Knoll Trail System for their 17,500 acre reservation. In 1971, I worked on the Philmont staff, as a Ranger, and I was able to see most of Philmont over the summer. I traveled to the University of Alaska in Fairbanks that fall, but I had to drop out later due to the lack of work and jobs in Alaska at that time. During the years between '72 and '77, I traveled to every state in the union except three. I worked at a variety of different jobs along the way. Each summer I would return to Powhatan to work on the summer staff then I would leave again in the fall. I do not regret leaving school because of the incredible experience I received during those years.

In 1978 I applied for the Rangers job at the Blue Ridge Mountains Council, but I was told that it would be a matter of time before the job became available. At about the same time, I was approached by Mr. Earl Powell from the Peninsula council in regard to the rangers job at Chickahominy. At that time, the job was not available, but I told him that I would send a resume' to the council. I was contacted in February by Mr. Jordan and invited down to take a look at the camp.

OUR RANGER


I accepted the councils job offer three days later and moved in to begin working toward the impending Conclave. That was over a year ago and my wife and I are very pleased with the reception that we have received from everyone. Everybody probably knows a few camp ranger jokes but I feel that I am taken very seriously by the O.A. and troops that camp here throughout the year. I am involved as a Scoutmaster and an Explorer Post Advisor and I care about the things that take place in this camp and in this council.

If you have read down to this line you may as well finish reading the article so that you can get to page 3. The O.A. is easily the most valuable workforce that I can use. For each function I submit a list of projects around camp that would be too much for one man to handle. At the past Ordeal in March, we completed 35 major projects before eleven o'clock.
