

- TAX DEDUCTIONS -

Much of the money you spend each year in your Scouting activities is allowable as a tax deduction for both state and federal returns. Some of these authorized deductions are: annual registration fees; transportation expenses to and from Scouting events and meetings; purchase price of the uniforms, emblems and insignia; maintenance and cleaning of uniforms and equipment which are required for use in the performance of your volunteer service; actual unreimbursed expenses incurred by attending Scouting conventions and training conferences; unreimbursed expenses from using stationery, mailing cost, telephone calls made, refreshments at meetings, cost of training literature, equipment, paint, lumber, and other supplies used directly for Scouting; Sustaining Membership and Memorial Fund contributions. RE-MEMBER, adequate records must be maintained to receive allowable deductions.





BROTHERHOOD REQUIREMENTS

- 1. Know the Obligation and the Order of the Arrow song, both of which appear below.
- 2. Know the Admonition, the Sign of Ordeal Membership and the handclasp. (Ask a Brotherhood member either before or at the event you choose as your Brotherhood test.)
- 3. Remain registered in Scouting and, during a period of at least 10 months, strive to fulfill your obligation by continuing and expanding your service to your own unit.
- 4. Remain registered in the Order of the Arrow and keep your dues paid. Be aware that acceptance of Brotherhood membership involves an obligation to the lodge and, therefore, develope a concrete idea of how you plan to fulfill this additional responsibility.
- 5. When, after at least 10 months after taking the Ordeal, you feel that you are meeting all of the above requirements and earnestly feel that you are prepared for the Brother-hood, you must write a letter to the Lodge Recording Secretary in which you:
 - a. explain what you think the OBLIGATION means;
 - b. describe how you have been fulfilling this Obligation in your troop or post and in your daily life, and how you have used your understanding of the traditions of the Ordeal to aid you in your service;
 - c. describe the specific plans you have for rendering service to the lodge in fulfillment of the new pledge you expect to take.

This letter should accompany your reservation and fees for the Ordeal/Fellowship weekend or other Brotherhood advancement event at which you wish to take your Brotherhood test and accept the additional obligations of the Brotherhood.


THE OBLIGATION

- Have earned Hiking, Camping & Cooking skill awards.
 Active in Troop for 6 months prior to July 1, 1981.

4. Approved by Scoutmaster.

- 5. Participate in a 3-day pre-Jamboree training exercise in 1981. (Date & location not yet determined)
- 6. File a Health & Medical record prior to training.

If you meet the above requirements & wish to attend the Jamboree, file a "Boy Scout Application & Local Council Information" form at the service center with a \$10 reservation fee.

Peninsula Council can send # Scouts. Each Troop will be allowed 1 reservation until June 2, 1980. After that date it will be on a first come, first taken basis. Example; if only 20 troops register a scout; the other 34 places could all go to one troop if their scouts register first. Deadline for all registrations is September 1, 1980.

A Tribute to Our Founder



The Order of the Arrow was born out of one man's ability to put a great idea - - a dream - - to work; another man's interest in Indian lore; and another man's willingness to share in the dream.

The year: 1912. There was a man: age about 25. Name: E. Urner Goodman. He was the scout-master of Troop 1 in Philadelphia, Pa.

There was another man: Dr. William Hinkle by name. He was scoutmaster of Troop 155 in Philadelphia. He was a surgeon by profession. By hobby, he was an Indian lore enthusiast who had dug deep into the history, lore, legendry, customs, and costumes of Lenni Lanape Indians.

Urner Goodman, Dr. Hinkle and another friend, Carroll A. Edson, frequently got together and talked over scouting, indian lore and camping. But as the years went by - 1912, 1913,1914 - Urner Goodman moved from the volunteer status in scouting to that of a professional. His first assignment - scout executive of the Philadelphia Council. Thus, he fell heir to becoming the camp director at Treasure Island Scout Camp. The camp was big and well known, an island in the middle of the Delaware river, about 60 miles north of Philadelphia. The year was 1915.

Urner Goodman's dream began to materialize. His idea of a camp honor society came to
life on a July night while chatting with some
of the camp staff around the embers of a late
camp fire. There would be an honor brotherhood
of veteran campers who were setting the example
of cheerful service in daily scout life.
Membership would be by invitation only and
meetings would be for members only.

But, unlike similar groups, arrowmen would not decide who should join. Urner Goodman felt from the outset that a formal induction ceremony, based on indian lore, was very important. So he and his assistant camp director, Carroll Edson, paid a visit to their good friend Dr. Hinkle. He came up with an ancient legend, long forgotten by most men, and nearly lost in time. It was a legend about a Lenape Chief named Chinachgook and his son, Uncas. Urner Goodman realized that the legend, paired with the ideas of the Scout Oath and Law, cound not but mightly affect the boys who were to undergo the first induction ceremony of the Order.

Then on Friday, July 16, 1915, in the woods at the southern end of Treasure Island, the Wimachtendienk (as it was then called), held its first membership ceremony. This original ceremony consisted of three parts.

First, each candidate, in his turn, placed a small bundle of twigs on the fire. As the fire blazed more brightly, the candidates realized they had shown the principle of cheerfulness; for by adding to the blaze of the fire, thus illuminating the ring, they had added to the cheer of their fellows.

Second was a test to climb an elevation at the side of the council ring. They were all unsuccessful climbing unaided, but in helping one another they were successful, thus demonstrating the principle of service to others.

Lastly, each candidate vainly tried to encircle his arms around the large tree near the ring. But when joined by one of the officers, they succedded in encircling the tree. This signified the principle of brotherhood.

The ordeal ceremony had changed much over the years but the basic principles have ever remained constant.

On October 28, 1916, the Wimachtendienk W. W. held its fall meeting at the Camp Van Rensselear cabin at Camp Hill, Pa. In the cabin were gathered some of the members who had recently been inducted. Carroll Edson was given the test of brotherhood in the presence of the group. At its conclusion, Urner Goodman reversed Edson's sash, thus making him the first Brotherhood member. This sealing of membership in our order is still perpetuated today. It signifiles an arrowman's willingness to continue faithfully to serve his brother, the Arrow and scouting.

Overlooking the valley of the Delaware stands the Devil's Tea Table. This sight is woven into the traditions of the Arrow. During the last week of August 1915, an historical incident took place at the Devil's Tea Table - - our order's first vigil ceremony - -.

The Order of the Arrow was born in simple ceremonies. But its impact was far from simple on the young men who were inducted at Treasure Island during the Order's infant years. From that time forward, the Order of the Arrow has been centered in the camping program, not only in its original setting at Treasure Island, but in hundreds of councils of the Boy Scouts of America. Now there are over 500 lodges, and the Order of the Arrow is accepted as a very important segment of the camping program.

In 1948, the National Executive Board of the Boy Scouts of America completely integrated the Order of the Arrow as part of the program of the scouting movement. The National Lodge of the Order was then dissolved. APRIL 1980

The year 1954 marked the first National Convention for the Order of the Arrow and for which we developed a theme: "The Order of the Arrow Strengthens the Unit and Council Camping Program".

Each time the Arrow met, it was stronger than before, and each time it set ambitious goals of service.

All this and much more is the heritage of one arrowman . . Dr. E. Urner Goodman.

Even after retiring from professional scouting, Urner Goodman worked for the welfare of young boys and men. He became the First National Director of the United Churchmen of America under the auspices of the National Council of Churches. He was one of the founders and has been chairman for the National Education Recreation Council. Among other activities, he was an incorporator of Religion in American Life, and an active member of the Hymn Society of America for many years. He had several of his hymns and songs published. In 1954, the National Council of the Boy Scouts of America presented him the Silver Buffalo Award for distinguished service to boyhood on the National level. He also received scout decorations from Norway and the Netherlands. He was not only the Honorary Chief of the Order of the Arrow but also an Honorary Chief of the Blackfoot Indian tribe.


