




## ORDEAL





Urner Goodman, and also highlighted some of the outstanding areas of service and participation of the SE-1 area lodges compared to the region and national statistics. 

PROPOSED CHANGE TO LODGE RULES

At its May meeting the Lodge Executive Committee approved the following motion as a proposed change to the Lodge Rules.

Motion: That Section III B, of the Lodge Rules, dated February 1978, be deleted, and the following substituted therefore:
Section III, Lodge Officers, Executive Committee and Advisers. B. Lodge officers elections shall be conducted at the Summer Ordeal-Fellowship, and the new officers shall be installed prior to the Ordeal candidate induction ceremony at the Summer Ordeal-Fellowship. This proposed change will be voted upon by the full lodge membership at the Summer Ordeal general membership meeting.




### LEADERSHIP ENCOURAGEMENT
