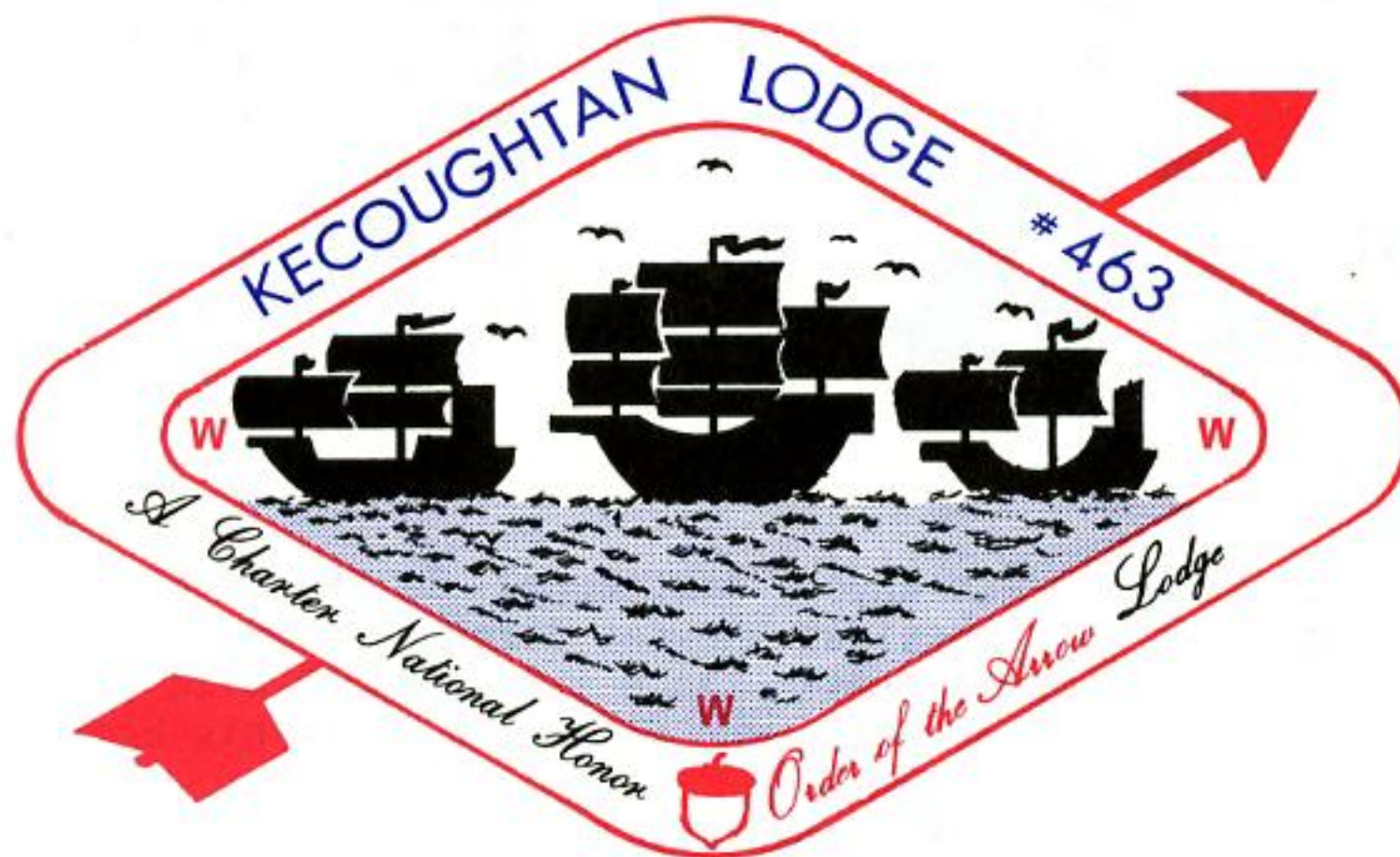

OUR FIRST HONOREE TONIGHT BEGAN HIS SCOUTING AS A CUB SCOUT IN FEBRUARY, 1976, AT BAUMHOLDER, GERMANY, WHERE ^{he} RECEIVED HIS ARROW OF LIGHT 2 YEARS LATER AND ENTERED TROOP 96. NEXT CAME SERVICE AS DEN CHIEF AND PATROL LEADER WHILE A MEMBER OF TROOP 1392 IN DALE CITY, VIRGINIA; NATIONAL CAPITAL AREA COUNCIL. HIS NEXT TROOP WAS 118, FORT BELVOIR, VIRGINIA. HE ATTAINED THE RANK OF EAGLE AND SERVED AS SENIOR PATROL LEADER, ASSISTANT SENIOR PATROL LEADER, INSTRUCTOR, JUNIOR ASSISTANT SCOUTMASTER, AND, AGAIN, DEN CHIEF. THERE HE BEGAN HIS DISTINGUISHED ORDER OF THE ARROW SERVICE: ORDEAL, 1981; BROTHERHOOD 1982; CAMP STAFF MEMBER AT TOMAHAWK, GOSHEN, ROCK ENON, AND CHICKAHOMINY, THIS LAST SERVICE SINCE TRANSFERRING FROM AMANGAMEK WIPIT TO KECOUGHTAN. HE IS NOW THE SENIOR PATROL LEADER OF TROOP 45, FORT EUSTIS, VIRGINIA, WEARS 5 PALMS ON HIS EAGLE RIBBON, AND IS A MASTERFUL JUNIOR LEADER DEVELOPMENT TRAINER. HE HAS SERVED ON THE ORDER OF THE ARROW SERVICE CORPS AT THE DIAMOND JUBILEE NATIONAL JAMBOREE, WAS UNIT ELECTIONS CHAIRMAN OF KISKIACK CHAPTER, IS THE CHAIRMAN FOR THIS CHRISTMAS BANQUET, AND IS THE CHIEF OF KECOUGHTAN LODGE !

VIGIL HONOREES CON'T.

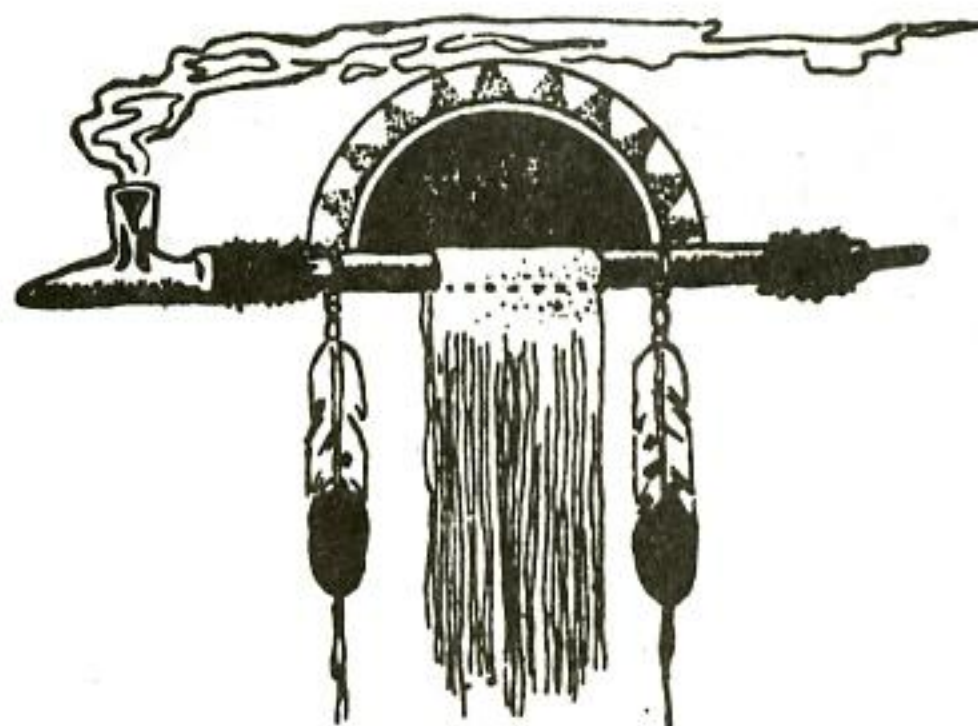

OUR SECOND HONOREE TONIGHT ALSO BEGAN HIS SCOUTING IN GERMANY, IN 1970 AT AUGSBURG. THERE HE EARNED HIS ARROW OF LIGHT AND JOINED HIS FIRST TROOP. SOON AFTERWARD HE TRANSFERED TO TROOP 45, AT FORT EUSTIS, AND LATER, TO TROOP 316, WHERE HE STILL SERVES. HE EARNED HIS EAGLE IN 1977 AND WEARS 4 PALMS. HIS SPLENDID ORDER OF THE ARROW SERVICE BEGAN IN KECOUGHTAN LODGE IN 1977, SEALING HIS MEMBERSHIP WITH THE BROTHERHOOD CEREMONY A YEAR LATER. HE HAS SERVED THE LODGE AT BOTH CHAPTER AND LODGE ASSIGNMENTS CONTINUALLY. KISKIACK CHAPTER CAMPING PROMOTION CHAIRMAN AND ACTING CHAPTER CHIEF, TRADING POST AND ENGRAVING COMMITTEE SERVICE, LODGE CAMPING PROMOTION CHAIRMAN AND THEN CAMPING PROMOTION ADVISER. HE IS A GRADUATE OF THE ORDER OF THE ARROW NATIONAL LEADERSHIP SEMINAR, HAS BEEN A DELEGATE TO 4 SECTION CONCLAVES, WAS ON THE LODGE CEREMONIAL TEAM, AND RECEIVED TRAINING AND WAS A TRAINER AT 4 LODGE OFFICER TRAINING EVENTS. HE HAS EARNED HIS WOODBADGE BEADS, IS A MEMBER OF BOTH HIS DISTRICT AND THE COUNCIL CAMPING COMMITTEES, HAS SERVED ON THE ADULT STAFF FOR CAMP CHICKAHOMINY FOLLOWING GRADUATION FROM THE NATIONAL CAMP SCHOOL, HAS EARNED BOTH THE BACHELOR AND MASTERS DEGREES FROM THE PENINSULA COLLEGE OF COMMISSIONER SCIENCE, HOLDS AN ASSOCIATE DEGREE IN POLICE SCIENCE FROM THOMAS NELSON COMMUNITY COLLEGE, AND WORKS AT THE NEWPORT NEWS SHIPYARD WHILE COMPLETING HIS COLLEGE IN NIGHT SCHOOL.

VIGIL HONOREES CON'T.

THE THIRD AND FINAL ARROWMAN TO BE HONORED THIS EVENING WAS A MEMBER OF A BOY SCOUT TROOP BRIEFLY AS A BOY, BUT HAS BEEN AN INSPIRING AND TIRELESS SCOUTER SINCE JOINING THE LEADERSHIP OF PACK 13, HAMPTON, VIRGINIA IN 1975, FIRST AS WEBELOS DEN LEADER, THEN CUBMASTER. HE MOVED DIRECTLY TO TROOP 13, WHERE HE HAS SERVED AS SCOUTMASTER FOR THE PAST 6 YEARS. HE WAS INDUCTED INTO THE ORDER OF THE ARROW BY KECOUGHTAN LODGE IN 1980 AND OBTAINED BROTHERHOOD IN 1982. HE ASSUMED THE ADVISERSHIP OF PAMUNKEY CHAPTER IN 1983 AND THE CHAPTER HAS PROSPERED. HE LEADS HIS TROOP AS WELL AS HIS CHAPTER TOWARD GREATER SERVICE TO THE COMMUNITY AND TO CAMP CHICKAHOMINY DURING CAMPING WEEKENDS AS WELL AS LODGE EVENTS. HE EARNED HIS WOODBADGE BEADS IN 1981, AND BECAME A WOODBADGE STAFFER IN 1985. HE SUCCESSFULLY BALANCES HIS RESPONSIBILITIES TO HIS WIFE AND 3 CHILDREN WITH SERVICE TO CHURCH, AS WELL AS SCOUTING, WHICH HAS INCLUDED CHAIRMANSHIP OF EITHER A DISTRICT CAMPOREE OR FIRST AID MEET EVERY YEAR SINCE 1980. HE ALSO SERVES ON THE HAMPTON DISTRICT SCOUT ROUNTABLE STAFF AND HEADED THE SCOUT DEPARTMENT INSTRUCTOR STAFF FOR THE 1985 PENINSULA COLLEGE OF COMMISSIONER SCIENCE.

After a hard day's work, I went through the Ordeal Ceremony with the candidates. That brought back lots of good memories.

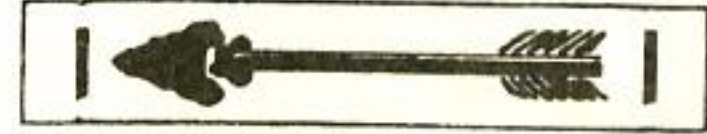
Then came dinner. Boy was I starved. The food was good and I ate my fill.

BROTHERHOOD REQUIREMENTS

1. Know the Obligation and the Order of the Arrow song, both of which appear below.
2. Know the Admonition, the Sign of Ordeal Membership and the handclasp. (Ask a Brotherhood member either before or at the event you choose as your Brotherhood test.)
3. Remain registered in Scouting and, during a period of at least 10 months, strive to fulfill your obligation by continuing and expanding your service to your own unit.
4. Remain registered in the Order of the Arrow and keep your dues paid. Be aware that acceptance of Brotherhood membership involves an obligation to the lodge and, therefore, develop a concrete idea of how you plan to fulfill this additional responsibility.
5. When, after at least 10 months after taking the Ordeal, you feel that you are meeting all of the above requirements and earnestly feel that you are prepared for the Brotherhood, you must write a letter to the Lodge Recording Secretary in which you:
 - a. explain what you think the OBLIGATION means;
 - b. describe how you have been fulfilling this Obligation in your troop or post and in your daily life, and how you have used your understanding of the traditions of the Ordeal to aid you in your service;
 - c. describe the specific plans you have for rendering service to the lodge in fulfillment of the new pledge you expect to take.

This letter should accompany your reservation and fees for the Ordeal/Fellowship weekend or other Brotherhood advancement event at which you wish to take your Brotherhood test and accept the additional obligations of the Brotherhood.

I do hereby promise on my honor as a Scout that I will always and faithfully observe and preserve the traditions of the Order of the Arrow, Wimachtendienk, Wingolauchsik, Witahemui, which I have now received. I will always regard the ties of brotherhood in the Order of the Arrow as lasting, and will seek to preserve a cheerful spirit, even in the midst of irksome tasks and weighty responsibilities, and will endeavor so far as in my power lies, to be unselfish in service and devotion to the welfare of others.

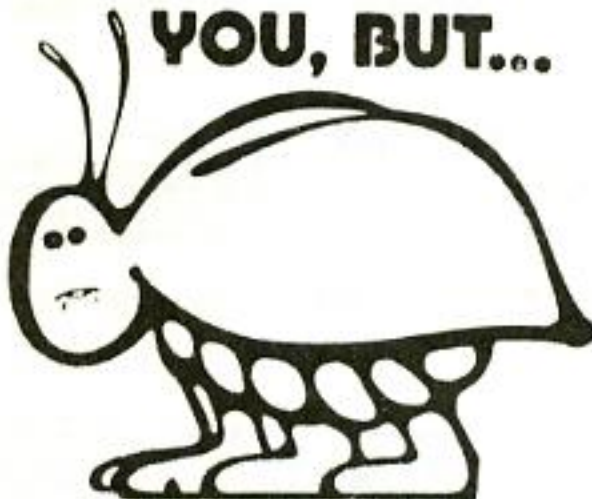
