



OA AILMENTS

Here is a list of some of the most common ailments found in an OA Lodge. Can you find the ones you are quilty of?

PATCHITOSIS - Characterized by wild outbreaks of patches. In more severe cases patches will cover practically every part of the lodge program. Becomes deadly when people believe that patches make the lodge better.

TRINKETUS - A disease of the individual lodge member. It's symptoms include gaudy breakouts covering all parts of the uniform. It usually runs its

course when the member realizes how silly he looks.

INJUNITUS - Characterized by the feeling that Indian lore is the most important part of the lodge. This disease is easy to diagnose, but difficult to cure.

MONARCH DISEASE - Characterized by a single member taking over all functions of the entire body. He won't let anyone else help for fear it won't get done right. In severe cases, the body becomes addicted to this disease and demands this role from a member.

PEDESTAL SYNDRONE - Characterized by the feeling that the Order is more important than Scouting. High Unit Leader Opposition Pressure usually follows. Collapse is slow but sure. It is a common member of the Visionous Lack family.

VISIONOUS LACKITUS - Characterized by a lack of appreciation for the Order's role in inspiring cheerful service outside it's service projects. Often accompanied by the council's belief that the only use of the lodge is the maintenance of summer camp (which could account for the common name "Workhorse Disease"). Symptoms include poor ceremonies, poor inductions and membership apathy. Can be cured with the understanding that Dr. Goodman founded the Order TO PROMOTE THE SCOUT OATH AND LAW BY EXAMPLE OF THE MEMBERS: that the major role of work projects is to convey the ideal of Cheerful Service to the members. Very common disease.
