

FIVE RECEIVE VIGIL HONOR

A highlight of the year in Kecoughtan Lodge is the announcement of the award of the Vigil Honor, the highest mark of distinction awarded in the Order. The Vigil cannot be won by a person's conscious endeavor. It comes in recognition of unselfish leadership in service. Five Kecoughtan Brothers received Vigil in 1991.

- John Harrington John has been a Kecoughtan Brother since 1988. His service to the Lodge included work as Chairman of the Service Committee, Chairman of the Kitchen Committee, Lodge Treasurer, Newsletter Chairman, and work on the Ceremonial Team. In Troop 6 he has been a Patrol Leader, Assistant Senior Patrol Leader, Senior Patrol Leader, Junior Assistant Scoutmaster, and Assistant Scoutmaster. He achieved Eagle in 1988. John is a freshman at Old Dominion University.
- Herb Smith Herb has been a member of Kecoughtan since 1988. His service to Scouting has included duties in the Cub Scout Program and as a Scoutmaster for Troop 48. Currently, he is an Assistant District Commissioner in Ironclad District. In Kecoughtan he has been active with the Ceremonial Team, helping that team to receive high recognition at the 1990 NOAC.

NOAC NEWS

The biggest event in the Order of the Arrow is the National Order of the Arrow Conference (NOAC). It is always held on a college campus and Kecoughtan always sends a delegation. The upcoming NOAC will be no exception: it will be big and Kecoughtan Brothers will attend.

The 1992 NOAC will be held at the University of Tennessee in Knoxville. The dates are August 9-13, 1992. Cost is being worked out and will depend on transportation. It is anticipated that total cost including transportation, lodging, food, miscellaneous fee, and conference participation will be approximately \$300. Brothers who travel to and from NOAC by separate means will pay \$210 (the national fee plus the miscellaneous fee). In either case, any unused portions

of the miscellaneous fee will be refunded after the conference.

1992 SE-8 CONCLAVE

The 1992 Conclave will be hosted by Chanco Lodge at Lakeland High School in Suffolk. The dates are April 24-26, 1992. This is the annual gathering of the Lodges of SE-8 (our section of the OA). Most of the State of Virginia will be represented.

Conclave is one of the best ways to learn about operations of the Lodge. Competitions are held in each of the key areas (camp promotion, newsletter, dance team, ceremonies). There are classes about the Lodge and you can choose what you want to learn about. However, it is NOT all work. There will be sports competitions, ceremonies, patch trading, and lots of Brotherhood.

COMPUTER BULLETIN BOARD

Scouting now has a dedicated computer bulletin board. It is called the TransMountain Scouting BBS and is run on a voluntary basis. The purpose of the BBS (bulletin board service) is to bring Scouts from all across the country into one informal source to trade ideas and information. There are sections devoted to various Scouting and OA graphics and a section on patch trading. The BBS number is (615) 579-0214. For experienced persons it is 300/1200/2400 bps, 8-N-1, ANSI ON, 24 hours/7 days, and uses THE MAJOR BBS (2-line) software by Galacticomm. There is a PHONE CHARGE to Knoxville, Tennessee.

JAMBOREE UPDATE

Plans for the 1993 National Jamboree continue to be made at the National level and here in Peninsula Council. Scouts and Scouters from Kecoughtan should begin now to make their own arrangements to participate.

The Jamboree will accept 29,680 boys and adults in 742 provisional troops that will arrive at the site (Fort A.P. Hill, Virginia) on August 2, 1993. The closing show will be August 10th. Peninsula Council will have three troops. Cost figures are not final but will be in the \$425 to \$475 range.

Boys who participate must be at least 12 years old by July 1, 1993 and must be a First Class Scout. Adult qualifications are established for each troop job (scoutmaster and three assistants).

HAVE YOU PAID YOUR 1992 DUES?

Kecoughtan Lodge has a dues structure of \$5.00 per year when the dues are paid on time. The dues go to \$6.00 per year if not paid on time. An Arrowman can also pay a one-time fee of \$50.00 for LIFETIME membership in Kecoughtan. This lifetime membership is not transferable to the other lodges. Annual dues should be paid before November 30 of the year preceding the year for which the dues are assessed. Therefore, the 1992 dues should have been paid before November 30, 1991. Check the label on this flyer. If the upper right hand corner does not have LIFE, 1992 or 1993, you are delinquent in the payment of your dues and now owe \$6.00 for the 1992 dues. The labels were printed on January 7, 1992 so if you have paid since then it will not reflect your payment. If an Arrowman was a member of Kecoughtan Lodge and did not pay dues for 1991, he should pay the delinquent dues for 1991 (\$6.00) and the 1992 dues (additional \$6.00) at the same time or he may pay the LIFETIME membership fee of \$50.00. This is the last correspondence you will receive from Kecoughtan Lodge if you are delinquent and if your dues are not paid by the conclusion of the Winter Ordeal which is scheduled for the weekend of February 21-23, 1992.
