Dear Brothers,

Coming up at the May Ordeal, Youth Lodge Leader Elections for '94 - '95 will be held.

1993 LODGE BANQUET

The banquet chairman, Rick Singletary, able assisted by Mike Johnson, led the activities. The dance team presented the opening with the flag and obligation. A new caterer offered a new Italian menu. The holiday cake was again supplied by the American Legion with great appreciation.

The guest speaker for the evening was Si Simons, the former Section 8 advisor. Mr. Simons has been awarded the O/A Distinguished Service Award, the Silver Beaver. and the Silver Antelope. Mr. Simons speech was full of humor about himself and Kecoughtan lodge members. The main thrust of his talk was about the proud history of Virginia O/A lodges and the prominent part that Kecoughtan played in developing the service to its councils. Mr. Simons had many historical patches of the Section displayed for arrowmen to relate to the history of the area.

The main purpose of the gathering was the recognition of great arrowmen of Kecoughtan Lodge.

Walter Deal was recognized as the first council recipient of the James E. West Fellowship Award. His special contributions to the council were recorded with a \$1,000 donation to the council endowment fund.

EIGHT RECEIVE VIGIL HONOR

A highlight of the year in Kecoughtan Lodge is the announcement of the Vigil Honor, the highest mark of distinction awarded in the Order. The Vigil cannot be won by a person's consciouis endeavor. It comes in recognition of unselfish leadership in service. Eight Kecoughtan Brothers received Vigil in 1993.

- Jason Ayers: Started Scouting in i982.
 After earning his Arrow of Light in 1988 he crossed over to Troop 6. Elected in June 1898 be became brotherhood in 1990. Has worked on Kitchen/Dinning Hall Committee and is now Chairman.
- Rodney Beltz: Engle Scout and former Camp Staff member he was inducted in June 1988. He made Brotherhood the next year and is a member of the Kecoughtan Dance team. He has been Elangomat Chairman for two years and introduced the Nimat Brotherhood incentive to our lodge.
- Sean Vulcan: Member of Troop 103 in Williamsurg where he was awarded the Sandy Kelly Award. He received the rank of Eagle in 1993. Sean has been a member of Kecoughtan Lodge since June 1990 and earned Brotherhood the following year. He has been our lodge Service Chairman for two years.
- Courtney Green: Began Scouting in 1985 in Cub Pack 104. After receiving his Arrow of Light he joined Troop 100 and has been an active member. He achieved Ordeal in 1990 and brotherhood the next year. Courtney has been an active member of the lodge as vice chairman of the trading post. He has been chairman since 1991. Courthey has also attended two NOACs and the Jamboree in 1993.

- William (Bill) F. Vulcan: Awarded the Wood Badge in 1989, served as Unit Commissioner and Assistant District Commissioner. He is now the District Commissioner for First Colony District. He was been awarded the District Award of Merit in 1993.
- John (Jack) T. York: He has been Roundtable Commissioner, Cubmaster, Scoutmaster, and is currently Council Commissioner. He has earned Wood Badge, 2 Scouter's Keys, Scouter's Award, and the Silver Beaver.
- Dennis (Homer) Allen: Eagle Scout with a Bronze Palm from Oil City Pennsylvania. He has earned the Altera Dei Tara Religious Award. Having worked on various Camp Staffs, he has been Ecology and Field Sports Director (at Chickahominy). He earned his Wood Badge in 1993. Starting OA service in 1978 he has been an Assistant Scoutmaster in Troop 11 in French Creek Council.
- Barry Green: Barry began his scouting career in 1954 in Cub Scout Pack 104 in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania. He joined Troop 42 also in Harrisburg. In 1959, he earned the Eagle rank and became a member of the OA. One year later he received brotherhood. He is presently the Unit Commissioner of Pack 104 and Chesapeake Bay District Secretary. YOUR LODGE FLAP WHAT DOES IT MEAN?

The current Kecoughtan Lodge flap patch was introduced in 1989. The design (or, "Three-Ships" flap) is taken from the Kecoughtan neckerchief patch, which dates back to 1960 and the symbolism of our flap patch is significant. The most prominent feature, of course, is the group of Three-Ships at sea which reminds us of our region's great colonial heritage. The ships represent the Susan Constant, Godspeed, and Discovery that brought our forefathers to establish the first permanent English speaking settlement in America at Jamestown on April 26, 1607. The bright sky behind the ships is a sunrise representing a new beginning.

Also prominent on the flap is our Lodge totem, the acorn, representing the mighty oak forests that were bountiful in our region, reminding us of the saying, "From the tiny acorn, the mighty oak tree grows," the "463" on the acorn is our Lodge number that was assigned to us by the National Council as the 463rd OA Charter granted.

The three "Ws" at the corners and point of the flap represent the three points of the Scout Oath, and the "W.W.W." reminds us of our Obligation in the Order by literally translating from "Wimachtendienk, Wingolaouchsik, Witahemui" to "brotherhood, cheerfulness, service." The arrow not only indicates Ordeal, Brotherhood or Vigil Honor memberships status, but symbolizes the onward and upward course of the Order of the Arrow.

The white field inside the border represents the purity of purpose espoused by our founding fathers when they established the Order of the Arrow. The black border stands for the secrecy and mystery of our traditions and the importance to keep them within our Order. The border's unbroken stitch further signifies our chain of Brotherhood.
