KECOUGHTAN ELECTS JOHNSON CHIEF

For the first time Kecoughtan Lodge elected Lodges officers at the Spring Ordeal. In the past the Lodge has waited until the Summer ordeal, but this frequently caused problems when the Chief, or other major officers, went off to college. Last year the executive board voted to move the election up to the Spring Ordeal to allow the needed continuity. The following were elected for 1994-95 by the voting members:

- Mike Johnson, Chief: The new Chief is a member of Troop 103 in Williamsburg. His service to the Lodge includes two years as Recording Secretary and a year as Membership Secretary. He was 2nd Vice Chief 1993-94. He joined the Lodge in 1989. He has been Senior Patrol Leader for his Jamboree Troop in 1993 and is a Life Scout who received the Vigil Honor in 1992. Mike is a rising senior at Lafayette High School.
- John Athayde, 1st Vice Chief: John is a member of Troop 200 in Grafton. He entered the Lodge in 1991 and is currently a Brotherhood member. This is John's second election to 1st Vice Chief. John has served on the Ceremony Team for three years and was chairman in 1993. His ceremony roles have included Allowat Sakima (Pre-Ordeal and Ordeal) Nutiket (Brotherhood). John has served his troop as Senior Patrol Leader, Assistant Senior Patrol Leader, and Troop Guide. He is a Life Scout and a rising senior at Walsingham Academy.

The Spring 1994 Ordeal

LARGEST ORDEAL CLASS

The Spring 1994 Ordeal was held May 20-22, 1994 and was one that will be remembered for some time. No one could remember an ordeal where there were 83 ordeal candidates. There were also 25 brothers who obtained Brotherhood in the Order. Total attendance was greater than 200 Arrowmen. This sort of attendance makes the work of the Order much easier. It is team work that gets the work done. Thanks brothers for a great ordeal. Our Service Chairman, Sean Vulcan, reported that a great deal of work was done during the ordeal. Ranger Sam Clymans and his wife Jackie delivered tents to all the camp sites prior to our arrival so that the set up of each site was made much easier. In addition to setting up the tents, the fire boxes were repaired, cots and mattresses were delivered to each site, the warehouse and shop were cleaned and straightened up and many dead and hazardous trees were removed. Improvements were completed to the new shower houses and electrical maintenance was completed. Several adults were punished for past sins and required to measure and film every building and structure on the camp for insurance purposes. This job, which is probably important to someone, should be reserved for trouble making adults. It should also be reported that the Kitchen crew did an outstanding job during the ordeal.

MEMORIES OF AN ORDEALIE

Friday was a time of anticipation. The time finally came that I had dreamed about and waited for with excitement. When I first arrived at camp, and the apprehension started to set in. A concern over the unknown began to mount. Not knowing what was about to happen brought an uneasy feeling. Sure I knew what other scouts had told me about being out at night, no talking, and of course the hard work. However, this was still unsettling because of the unknowns. The strangers, even though they were Arrowmen, were going to take me off to some unknown place and do undreamable acts to me.

Kichkinet, the guide, seem like some sort of helpful one. Maybe he was truly going to help along the trail - he said so anyway. The Elangomat might be OK, at least he was always with us, for good or bad. He made us stay together, gave abrupt instructions, and tries to keep us busy, He was the one familiar face that stayed around when everyone else was coming and going, at what?, I do not know.

The meals were not so bad, but if they wanted us to do all that work, they should have fed us better. Keeping quiet was probably the most difficult thing to do. Every now and then a word gets out of your mouth. Most of the time you catch yourself in mid-sentence, but other times its out before you know what happened. There were times of boredom. You would think that they could keep you busy so that time would pass faster. It seems disorganized, but they must have known what they were doing since they have done it all before.

There were some times when I got to think about everything going on around me. There was a certain warm feeling. I thought about how I got there - doing what was necessary to advance in scouting and working with the patrol. The Ordeal seems like some sort of reward for all of that.

When they let me clean up and get ready for the ceremony, the tiredness really sunk in. All of this strange activity and people began to wear on me. The other candidates were really dragging. I hoped it wouldn't go on much longer. The little bit of food for dinner was disappointing, but at that point it didn't really matter. All I wanted to do is to get through this ceremony and go to bed. It seems like waiting and not knowing what is next is the real Ordeal.

The ceremony was mysterious. I had never seen anything like it - the candles, costumes, the unknown faces on the hill, and the sashes hanging on a rail. I didn't know what to do when these Indians direct me to do so many things. There seemed to be only darkness, the arrow, and the faces behind me. It was hard to listen to all the instructions. I felt like I was stumbling through the ceremony, but realized it was important that I follow everything, because I felt they might single me out to do something. I was concerned that I might not respond quickly, and would be embarrassing.

When the Chief shook my hand, it seemed like I had finally made it. Being one of the few maked me feel special, being chosen then began to have meaning. overwhelmed. The fire gave me a certain high. What a moment - I was chosen to be honored and its great! Just wait to see those guys back at the troop when they see me. All of a sudden the faces behind me rushed down to the circle to join in the singing of the song. Everyone was wearing the sash. Everyone was smiling and shaking hands. Relief sets in and it was all downhill from there. I can take anything now. I didn't know I could meet the challenge, but it really wasn't that hard. I can see that anyone can make it if they just try.

This is a big responsibility. I wonder if I'm up to it? I might be chosen, but this is a big job. They expect me to do a lot. One thing is for sure, when I go back to the troop I want to be a better scout. Putting that flap on means the others expect more from me and I am going to deliver.

All of these have become, the hallmark of the NOAC...one of the scouting events of a lifetime that every Arrowman should experience. Arrowmen from across the country will be sharing ideas, experiences and trading patches from early morning to late into he evening thoughout the conference.

The cost of this event is \$305 for youth. We have allocations for 20 youth and 10 adults.

SPARKS

I am Kichkinet, one of the central symbols of our Order! I am the friend whose example is far more eloquent than words. I am an encouraging 'voice' even in a great darkness, to those who have been vigilant in keeping the Scout Promise.

I am embodied by a lodge member during the Ordeal, for I must be living, breathing individual whom a canidate can know. I represent the qualities of Brotherhood, Cheerfulness, and Service in a way that causes them to spring to life. I am the Sprit of the Arrow Personified, but I am not the Spirit of the Arrow: I am a very real Friend.

The Arrow is a mental representation of the Spirit as it is individualized. I am very important in the Ordeal, when the canidate is being physically educated in the traditions of the Order. The member who is to represent me must receive special training and must understand why the Induction is set up as it is, its purpose, and the meaning of its symbolism. The very minimum of training will show him that he is not to be a supervisor, or monitor, but a Guide. He is the Guide of guides, for each canidate will return to his unit to lead his fellow Scouts in the Scout Promise, and he will lead as I have, by his own example.

- 1. Provide nominee's name
- 2. List nominee's date of birth (if known).
- List Ordeal date (if known).
- List Brotherhood date (if known). Nominee must have received Brotherhood at least two years prior to September 30th of the nomination year. (i.e., the 1994 nominee must have received Brotherhood no later than September 30, 1992.)
- 5. Give the nominee's current primary registered Scouting position.
- 6. List all of the OA positions which this individual has held or currently holds, (i.e., chapter/Lodge Officer, Chapter/Lodge Committee Chairman or Associate Chairman, Chapter/Lodge Adviser or Associate Adviser, etc.) If no positions were held, leave blank. Chapter/Lodge positions are not mandatory for Vigil Honor selection.
- 7. List all other Scouting positions previously held or currently holding excluding the positions listed in (5) & (6) above.
- List all Scouting awards received, (i.e., Eagle Scout, OA 75th Anniversary Award, District Award of Merit, Silver Beaver, Woodbadge Beads, etc.)
- Thoroughly list the qualifications of the nominee to receive the Vigil Honor as outlined in the OA
 Handbook. Primary attention should be given to the Lodge, Chapter, Unit, camp in cheerful service,
 camp promotion, and membership. Use extra pages as necessary.
- 10. List any other service that should be considered in evaluating the nominee.
- 11. List you phone number, the current date, and sign the nomination form.
- 12. Send to Lodge Advisor Carl Lewis, at 120 Starboard Circle, Newport News, Va 23602.
